**Colored Base Ball.**  
A baseball club, to be known as the Oxford Base Ball Club, was organized by the colored men of this city on Friday evening last. They are now in active preparation for the State Agricultural Fair to be held in Raleigh in November next. They propose to be well uniformed and to be the champion colored-base ballists of the State.

C., of the 23d regiment of Foot, has been promoted to a full Colonelcy in the British army. Col. O'Connor is a brother of our esteemed townsman, Mr. Dan. O'Connor, to whom we offer our congratulations on the military advancement of his brother across the water.

**Well Said.**  
A cotemporary wisely says: "What our country needs to-day more than the manufacturer, the merchant or the lawyer, is the farmer. It seems, however, next to impossible to get people to realize the fact or to act on it when they do. In spite of the hard times young men continue to lounge about large cities, where there is no hope of employment, waiting for something to turn up, and utterly neglecting the opportunities that are presented in the country. The truth is, people now-a-days are too much afraid of hard work, and decidedly object to that sort of living which has to be earned by the sweat of the brow. They had much rather live by the sweat of somebody else's brow, if they can."

**The Latest Snake Story.**  
As a party of young men were in the woods in Grant township, Pender county, a few days since, hunting after some bee cattle that had strayed away, they suddenly came upon a lot of rattlesnakes. One of the young men, named Hubert Hawkins, secured a good stick and made war upon the reptiles, and succeeded in killing every one of them. There were in all 21 rattlesnakes and one rattlesnake pilot, making 22 in all. This occurred in a locality where rattlesnakes are seldom seen, and it is something remarkable that so many should be found collected together, and a matter of congratulation that they were all destroyed.

**County Commissioners.**  
The Board of County Commissioners met yesterday at 2:30 p. m, present, Col. W. L. Smith, Chairman, and Commissioners A. J. Grady, J. A. Montgomery and H. A. Baggi.  
The minutes of the last meeting were read, and approved.  
The tax books for the county of New Hanover for the year 1879, being complete, were furnished to the Board by M. Cronly, Esq., examined, found correct, and accepted.  
S. H. Manning, Sheriff of New Hanover county, tendered the additional bonds required by the Board, \$40,000 for the collection of county, poor, school and special taxes, and \$25,000 for the collection of public taxes, aggregating with his old bond \$90,000, with sureties justifying to the amount of \$125,000, which said bonds were approved, and the Register of Deeds, instructed to deliver to the Sheriff the tax books for the year 1879, upon taking a receipt therefor.

Carston Monasan was granted a license to retail spirituous liquors.  
The Register of Deeds presented a duplicate of his annual Agricultural Statement for New Hanover county to the Department of Agriculture, which was ordered to be placed on file.  
The Board adjourned to the first Monday in October, the occasion of the regular monthly meeting.

**The Peanut Crop.**  
We are sorry to learn that the peanut crop, in this section, will not yield this Fall a full crop. The promises of the Spring and early Summer were very good, but the drouth has cut short the crop. The yield will probably reach 100,000 bushels, but will hardly exceed it, whereas good seasons would have given 125,000 or 130,000 bushels. Last year's crop was about 100,000 bushels. This includes estimates from Onslow, Pender, Duplin, New Hanover and Brunswick counties, embracing what is known in the market as Wilmington peanuts.
