Samples of the discovery have been sent to the most prominent scientific men throughout the country, so that there is a reasonable prospect that its claims for efficacy will be abundantly tested. We are informed that the Health Officers of this city and county have used this disinfectant with entire satisfaction. Magistrate's Court.

David Nixon was before Justice Hall to-day, charged with the larceny of a pistol, the property of Gen. H. Ward. In default of a bond of \$50 for his appearance he was committed for trial at the next term of the Criminal Court.

Shipments of Sturgeon. The sturgeon business in his city, that is to say, the shipment of the fish is carried on by two parties, separate and distinct from each other, viz: Messrs. John Carroll and W. A. Davis. The season is, "on" in the Spring from March 1st to May 1st, and in the Fall from September 1st to November 1st. Formerly there was a good profit made, but now, we are told, the margin is very close.

The fish is shipped hence to New York to dealers, and from them pass into the hands of the smokers, who prepare it for shipment, mostly to foreign markets. When smoked it closely resembles salmon and sells for from 12 to 15 cents a pound.

We have not been able to get Mr. Davis' report but learn that Mr. Carroll has shipped, since the 1st inst., 350 sturgeon, an aggregate of about 15,000 pounds, in less than four weeks.

Commercial Postage. There seems to be a good deal of misapprehension with reference to the recently enacted law of the postoffice department allowing "printed commercial paper filled out in writing" to be sent as third class matter. The difficulty is in making the distinction between commercial paper, partly written and partly printed, the written matter of which is in the nature of personal correspondence, and that which is not.

In a recent explanatory letter the department says: "What meaning is to be given to the clause is apparent when the language of the whole section is considered, and when full force is given to the word 'printed' preceding 'commercial.'" The department defines the intent to be, to permit partly printed commercial papers in ordinary use among business men to be regarded as third class matter. Papers which are constantly passing in the commercial community for business purposes, the blanks of which when filled, do not alter their character as papers in general use. Whenever there shall be a departure from this rule, there must be a departure from the rate. Words which, when not in the form used as the appropriate filling of blanks, but outside it unless simply a condensed statement of some matter in itself within the rates, as a brief statement of some fact or facts contained in a bill of lading) make the paper special or individual, and subject to the rate for personal correspondence. It must be observed in this connection that partly printed commercial papers, which are in themselves, or become the representative of a monetary value, are always subject to the rate for matter of the first class."
