It is a sad commentary upon the power of the government, that those whom it is under the most solemn obligations to protect are left entirely at the mercy of every law-defying adventurer. Nor is it to be wondered at that the savages should retaliate with all the bitterness and ferocity of which their natures are capable. They see that every promise and solemn pledge of the government is but a hollow mockery and they know by sad experience that the rapacity and cupidity of the white adventurers, who encroach upon the domain specially assigned for the various tribes, have no regard for the law, as they have no fear of punishment resulting from its violation.

If the government, after enacting a law for the benefit of the Indians, and giving them just and reasonable rights, would see to it that they were fully and amply protected in the unmolested enjoyment of those rights, there would be no trouble; but so long as legislation may direct its wisdom to a wise and humane policy for the protection of the savages, knowing, as they should know from long established precedent, that the law will be violated at will by the whites, we may expect the savage nature of the Indians will resent the wrong inflicted upon them.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 30, 1879. The campaign in Ohio is rapidly drawing to a close. The two weeks now remaining promise to be unusually exciting, and of course a great amount of political work will be done by both the great political parties in that State. Our intelligence from there in the past day or two from reliable and authentic sources, represents the Democrats as being confident of carrying the State on the popular vote and of having a majority in the Legislature, thus ensuring the election of U. S. Senator to succeed Thurman. One half of the members of the late Senate held over, a large majority of whom are Democrats, which is decidedly to their advantage and largely increases their chances of securing a majority in that body. Gen'l Ewing, according to all accounts, is making the most vigorous and effective canvass of the State ever known there, his meetings being attended by immense throngs of people and having a telling effect. He is aided by a corps of the most able and popular orators in that and adjoining States, among whom are McDonald and Voorhees, of Indiana, Thurman, Pendleton, Hurd, McMahon, Warner, Converse and a score of others who are addressing the people in various sections of the State and arousing them to the importance of the issues before them.

It is affirmed and denied that the removal of Senator Blaine's brother from a small place in the Capital was for other than political causes. A set of men who, in any Northern community, would damage the cause they espoused, is in daily meeting here for the purpose of 'reorganizing' the Republican party of the South. With a few honorable exceptions these men are such as had no standing before the war. With them politics is a trade, and it is probable that each of them had a dozen trades before he adapted that of politics. They expect to 'make something' in politics. One Brown, a colored man of this city, lately tried to prevent a secret society from using the name 'The United Order of the Sons and Daughters and Brothers and Sisters of Moses of the United States and World at Large.' He failed. The Courts would not protect the use of such a name. Speaking of secret societies, I am reminded that an organization in opposition to such societies has its headquarters here. From its advertisement, which appears in the Star I learn that in order more effectively to carry on its work of suppressing secret societies, it has organized one of its own. The official notice says: 'Masons and other Secret Society men join themselves together for mutual benefit, with secret oaths, and it behooves all opposed to such institutions to organize and know each other for protection.'
