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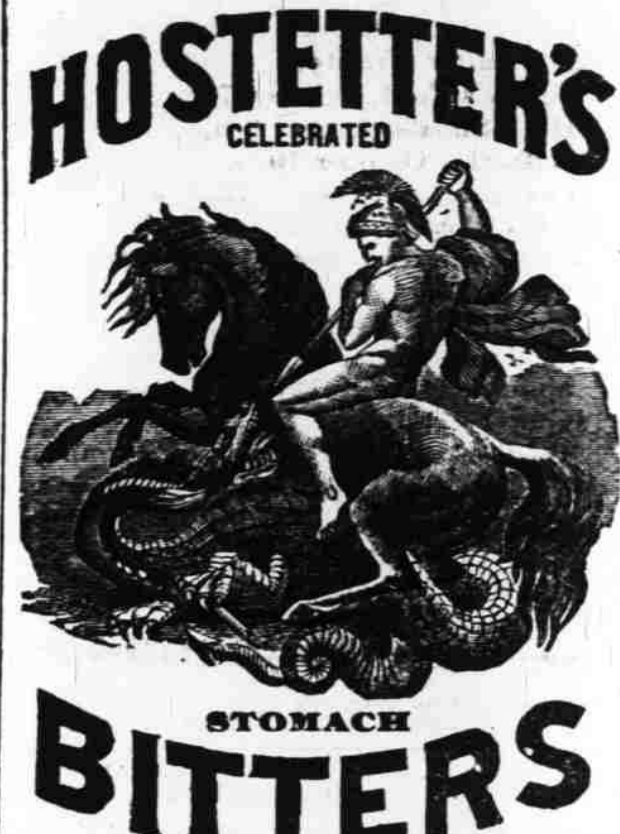
'Never mind; fancy I have,' said his customer, and away he went.
