The Reign of Terror,

Very few historic periods that are so nest are so little understood as the he go of Perron-probably because it partisali a manner Horrible as it was, it was less horrible than is commonly thought. It did not last nearly so long por were so many persons killed, as most persons believe. The terror proper began with the execution of Marie Autoinette, October 16, 1793 and ended with the beheading of Ro. bespierre, July 28, 1794, who was leady the head and front of its barbarous off-inding. It continued nine months and twelve days, though the popular opinion is that it extended through several years. The number of its victims has been greatly exaggerated, having been reported at as high as 10,000, 12,000, and even 20,000. The number has never been, and never can be, exactly ascertained; but it was between 3,300 and 3,600, as far as cau be computed—being probably nearer the former than the latter figures. Frenchmen are still quarreling over the cause, characteristics, and results of their great revolution, each judging of it by his bias of temperament and political opinions .-Albeit few regard it now as a deliberare onslaught of the populace on law, order, property and life, judgments of calm and philosophic men differ widely as to its consequences. Some esteem it to have been a dreadful slaughpronounce it one of the most inspiring events in history. Why Cotton Seed Kill Hogs.

A write in the Macon Telegraph and Messenger' argues that it is not and steadily increasing subscrip at all improbat le that much of the mortality among the swine of Georgia and ascribed to 'hog cholera,' is the result of eating fresh cotton seed, to which they have frequent access at field and spread out for manure. In proof of this suspicion he cites the following experience:

'We have lost scores of hogs both in um for advertising. Liberty and Baker county, from the esting of fresh cotton seed, and took some pains to investigate how the poison operated. Strictly speaking, there is no poisonous element in the seed itself. Repeated examinations of the intestines after death shows their action to be purely mechanical. The hogs gobble them up without proper mastication, and the seed, stimulated and warmed by the fluids of the stomach, forthwith begin to swell and spront. It is this germination that causes the death of the animal. As a proof of this, when the germ has been destroyed by long ex posure to the weather or steaming. hoge will eat the cotton seed with im-Maity. We have seen them burrow for weeks in a pile of old cotton seed EDITOR AND PUBLISHER. in a fermented state, eating them ad hbitum, without injury. Indeed, the writer has used cotton seed to fatten his meat hogs, mixed with rice flour, bran, turnips, potatoes or loose corn, and thoroughly boiled, with the happlest result. Even in a green state they are excellent food for cattle and EVERY FRIDAY, sheep, although the butter produced from the milk of a cow fed chiefly upon cotton seed is white and cheesy in its consistency.
