## First of the Season.

The Nor. barque *Prindaise Gyda*, 313 tons burthen, cleared and sailed from this port yesterday for Liverpool. She was loaded by Messrs Alex. Sprunt & Son, at the Champion Compress, and takes out 1,350 bales of cotton. She went directly from the city out to sea, drawing 15 feet of water. This is the first cargo of cotton shipped foreign this season.

The tribe latterly have been quite orderly and docile, and have seemed to manifest no warlike spirit, but their Tuesday's victory in Ohio has had the effect to arouse the latent fires of passion, and from now until after the next Presidential election, frequent outbursts of frenzy may be expected.

## THE OPERA HOUSE.

### "Unknown."

Quite a large audience greeted Mr. John A. Stevens at the Opera House last night to witness his extensively advertised play of "Unknown," and it may be judged from the frequent and vociferous applause given the several leading actors, all were highly pleased with the entertainment.

The piece is of a style and character which seems to have gained considerable popularity at the North in the last decade, much to the disparagement of Shakespeare, Sheridan Knowles and other old fogies, who make their chief actors, as indeed they do the humblest characters of their plays, utter words of wisdom, whereby those who witness the performance and listen to the utterances may learn something, and retire from the scene at the close of the play with a little information added to their stock of knowledge, together with some possible benefit that may account for the moral of the play.

The piece performed last night was a sort of thrilling sensation made up to excite the sympathy and fascinate the senses generally of the audience. It might be termed an emotional dramatic tragedy, while in some scenes there was more of Comedy than anything else, which excited the risibilities of the audience to an uncontrollable extent. Mr. Stevens, in the role of Harold, the "Unknown," performed his part throughout very well, but in his part of the mad-man, the poor insane unknown, with his wild froaks and still wilder stare of the crazy man, with an occasional glimpse of returning reason, we thought him particularly successful.

Miss Lottie Church, as Bessie Merribrigh, was pleasing, graceful and vivacious, to which may be added her own natural charms of beauty, which always lead an additional attraction to the actress, no matter what the role she assumes.  
Mr. W. R. Cooper, as Albert Storm King, the accepted lover of Bessie, was passing fair, while Mr. W. H. Bailey, as Jack 'Salt 'a breeze from the ocean," looked and acted as though he had just stepped from the deck of a British-man-of-war after a five and twenty years service.

Mr. G. F. Ketchum, as Jimmy 'with a lacerated heart' and Mr. C. B. Hawkins, as Pat "who hates a foreigner," were exceptionally good in their parts, the former exhibiting quite a versatile talent in acting, besides amusing the audience considerably by his inimitable mimicry, and always created a roar of laughter whenever he appeared upon the stage.

Mr. Stevens and Miss Church in answer to repeated calls appeared before the curtain twice during the evening.

The whole performance passed off very well and the majority in attendance seemed well pleased.

## CITY COURT.

Prince Le Boo, charged with disorderly conduct, was the first case arraigned this morning. The evidence being conclusive that the defendant, together with other colored boys, was mischief-making on the street last night by shoving over dry goods boxes, chicken coops, &c., and Mayor remanded him to the cell for ten days.

Richard Maultsby, charged with disorderly conduct, was the next on docket arraigned, but owing to the absence of witnesses the case was continued until tomorrow morning at half past 9 o'clock.

Melvin Moore alias Melvin Brown, charged with the theft of certain articles of plated silverware from Mr. A. A. Hartsfield's store, on Front street, yesterday morning, was put upon trial before Mayor Fishplate this morning, and the witnesses for the prosecution examined, Mr. Hartsfield testifying in substance to the account of the theft as it appeared in the Review yesterday afternoon, together with the thief's subsequent capture; other witnesses testified also to the same thing. The articles were also fully identified by Mr. Hartsfield as his property. The defendant was then asked by the Mayor what he had to say for himself, and his reply was, guilty. He was then ordered to give a justified bond in the sum of \$100 for his appearance at the next term of the Criminal Court, in default of which he was committed into the custody of the Sheriff.

This finished the business of the Mayor's Court for the day.

## Sanitary Engineering.

It also treats of the absolute necessity of pure water, and advocates a system by which an abundant supply may be procured that shall be freed from any of the noxious gases which contaminate and poison so many wells and springs. It also speaks at length of other matters pertaining to the general health of individuals as well as neighborhoods. The author has done a good work, for, although the facts he has presented are well known to every intelligent person, the subject has not received the attention its vital importance demands, and the truths presented by him may prompt a more careful consideration of the matter.

## Postal Reform.

The change which was recently made in the method of affixing postage stamps has resulted in a very considerable reform in the postal service. Under the old system, which was invented by a Methodist clergyman, one of Creswell's subordinates, postmasters at minor offices were paid their salaries on the basis of the amount of stamps sold at their respective offices. The result was the development of a great deal of thrift on the part of those petty offices. The postmasters induced their friends in the cities to buy their stamps of them, and many large wholesale houses purchased their stamps of country postmasters. The result was that little towns near the large cities often sold as many stamps in a quarter as the offices where the postmasters had regular salaries and had no inducements to increase the sales of their stamps. The consequence was that the method was changed and a new system adopted, by which the smaller class of postmasters were to be paid on the basis of the stamps canceled at their offices. Stamps are no longer used in the way of trade or sold at a discount, and there is a very great falling off in the amount of stamps sold during the last fiscal year. The sales of stamps at some of these minor offices under the old system was five times as great as reported for the last fiscal year.
