**A Bold Burglary.**  
Some time early this morning, probably about 5 o'clock, a burglar entered the room of Mr. DeL. Evans, at the residence of his father, on the corner of Nun and Third streets, and rifled that gentleman's clothing of his pocket book, with its contents, succeeding in getting off clear with his booty. About 5 o'clock this morning Mr. Evans, Sr., heard a noise but thought that it was his son moving in his room, and so paid no attention to it, and this was probably the movements of the burglar in leaving the house. He entered by a window opening into Mr. Della Evans' room, which is on the first floor, and, as it happened, this was the only window in the house which had not been secured overnight. The rascals carried off Mr. Evans' pocketbook, in which there was some \$15 in money, a promissory note which would have been due in a few days, and other papers of value to the owner. Nothing was known of the matter until this morning when the front door was found wide open, showing by what means the burglar made his exit. Mr. Evans has no suspicion as to who the rascal is but hopes that he will enjoy this haul so well that he will come back soon for some more.

Mr. Evans had also a very unpleasant experience on Thursday evening. While passing along Market street, but at what exact point he does not know, some one cut through his coat with the expectation, perhaps, of getting his pocket book, but in this he was disappointed.  
These facts go to show that there are some cunning and accomplished rogues somewhere in our midst, as likely as not importations from larger cities, and it would be well for the police detectives to be thoroughly on the alert.

**Alarms of Fire.**  
The alarm of fire this morning, about 7:30 o'clock, originated at the freight depot of the W. C. & A. R. R., and was caused by the igniting of four or five bales of cotton upon a flat car, from a spark, supposed to have come from the shifting engine. Luckily, the smoke was seen issuing from the cotton by Mr. Eugene Knight, engineer at the depot, before the wind had fanned the fire into flames, when the alarm was sounded and all hands turned out, including clerks as well as warehouse hands, and the fire was soon extinguished, the burning cotton being first thrown from the car to the ground, however, to prevent the other cotton from catching. The bagging on one end of one of the bales got into ablaze before it was all extinguished, and this is about the whole extent of the damage, which an amount of less than fifty cents would pay the cost of.  
**SECOND ALARM.**  
The second alarm of fire this morning was sounded about half-past ten o'clock and proceeded from a house in Sampson's Alley a few yards removed from Fourth street, located on the square between Mulberry and Walnut streets. The origin of the fire was a spark from the chimney of a dwelling occupied by the widow of the late James Sampson, colored, which ignited the shingle roof of the house, but before any damage could be done assistance was rendered by parties who were passing by at the time, who mounted to the roof, and with a few buckets of water extinguished the flames before the general alarm was given. The damage to that property is a mere trifle.

**Arrest of an Escaped Convict.**
