NEWS AND REVIEWS.

George Pyle, Wilmington, Del., machinist, claims to have invented a machine which will turn out two horseshoes in a second.

Hard times in Russia, but not for the Czar. The new yacht, Clyde built, will cost, exclusive for furnishing and decorations, \$1,000,000.

Property left for educational purposes by William Hulme of England, valued in 1691 at \$200, is now estimated at from \$2,500,000 to \$3,500,000.

The railroad from the Naples Observatory to the foot of the cone of Vesuvius will be opened early next year. A steam engine at the summit will draw the cars up by a windlass.

The Pennsylvania Republican State committee have issued an address, in which they kick State issues out the back door, and call on all the faithful to rally for the salvation of the country from the rebels.

Over three hundred thousand roubles in paper money, supposed to be contaminated with the plague poison, were burnt in the Russian city of Tzaritzin on the 18th of last month. This money was collected in the districts stricken by the plague.

The plat of ground at Schuylerville, N. Y., upon which the base of the Saratoga battle monument stands, was sold on Friday to satisfy a claim of Thomas Tooby for \$700. That day was the 102d anniversary of Burgoyne's surrender.

The Rev. William McKay, after reading several notices from his pulpit in the Methodist Church at Geneva, Ind., said there was another matter as to which he desired to inform his congregation. His wife had eloped with Mr. Hatton, a neighbor.

According to an official report 160 Turkish mosques and holy schools were destroyed at Roumelia and Bulgaria during the Russian occupation of these provinces; and about the same number of mosques and schools have been destroyed since the Russians left.

The tax levy in New York city for the current year will be about \$28,000,000, being 2.58 per cent., against 2.65 last year. The increase is attributed to various acts of the Legislature authorizing the board of estimates to increase its expenditures a quarter of a million or so.

A new and singular means of incendiary is reported by the Glos. In a village of Poland a cat was saturated with kerosene by an unknown party, and set on fire; the unhappy animal rushed furiously to and fro, spreading fire all around, till it perished in flames, together with a number of buildings.

The trousseau of the young Queen of Spain, designate, is described by Paris papers as exquisite. It includes a number of dresses devised from the fashions of the time of Louis XIII. At the wedding mass she will wear a dress of cloth of silver, with garlands brilliant with myrtle, orange flowers and lilies.

Of the total of 8,431 sets of woollen machinery in the United States, 1,418 are in Massachusetts, 331 in Maine, 505 in New Hampshire, 175 in Vermont, 469 in Rhode Island, and 659 in Connecticut—a total for the New England States of more than 43 per cent. of the woollen machinery in the entire country.

The cotton receipts of Atlanta, Ga., fell off in 1878 about 12,000 bales from those of 1877, and this year there will be a further decline of some 2,000 bales. But what Georgia is losing in cotton would seem to be made up in rich minerals. A single blast recently in the old Strickland mine, in Forsyth county, exposed a vein three feet in width with the gold so thick that it could be seen at a distance of ten paces.

The American Isabella grape planted in Wurtemberg, Germany, grows with extraordinary luxuriance, and during the present season, in which the German vineyards are generally in a rather poor condition, this is about the only vine that bears abundant fruit. The United States send cheese and beef to England, and grapes and lager beer to Germany. It remains now that they should furnish wines to France.

As a proof of the economy practised by the new Government of Egypt, the Austrian journal Bombe gives the following illustration: Criminals of a certain grade are sentenced to one hundred lashes with the bamboo cane, but a superior court has reduced the number to fifty, on the ground that the Government is obliged to spend too much for bamboo canes, when the lashes are too lavishly administered.

GRAND TRIUMPH OF THE TURKEY GOBLER.

Perhaps there is no member of either branch of Congress more odious to the South, and more justly so, than Roscoe Conkling, my Lord Senator from New York. Of undoubted ability and large experience in public affairs, he has long occupied the position of the foremost man of his party. Dictatorial and overbearing in manner, haughty and presumptuous in character, one would suppose that his arrogance and self-conceit, to say nothing of the stain upon his reputation in connection with the Sprague scandal, would have long since alienated his friends, and seriously impaired if not ruined his influence. Strange as it may seem the very reverse is the fact, for he has recently given incontrovertible evidence that his power is superior, not only with his party in his own great State, but the administration even have been compelled to pay obedience to him and to lick the hand that spurred them.

The fact is known of all men, that from the moment the present administration came into power, he has made no concealment of his contempt for the whole concern, and this feeling culminated into bitter hatred when his henchman, Cornell Collector of the Customs at New York, was removed from office. This removal was made ostensibly, and it was so stated by administration journals, in the interest of civil service reform, but everybody knew that it was an attack upon Conkling himself. That he so regarded it is unquestionable, for subsequent events have shown it, and shown also how great and how brilliant has been his triumph and the marvellous power of his resources. He bided his time, and doubtless remembered the words of the poet,

"There never yet was human power That could escape, if unforgiven— The patient watch and vigil long Of him, who treasures up a wrong."

With marvelous skill he so manipulated the discordant elements of the Radical party in New York, displayed such consummate address and developed such astonishing power, that at the Republican Convention held for the purpose of nominating a State ticket, he had simply to dictate the man for Governor.

"To shake his ambrosial curls and give his nod The stamp of fat and sanction of a God," and the obsequious convention with bowed heads obeyed his mandate. And who, think you, was the man he nominated? No other than Alorzo B. Cornell, the disgraced collector of the customs, he whom the administration did not consider worthy of any office in their gift. Now mark the wonderful triumph of the man. He has not only dictated to his party their candidate for Governor, but has forced the administration into his support; compelled the highest officer in the Cabinet to take the stump for him, and wrang from the trembling lips of Hayes himself the humiliating confession that if he lived in New York he would vote for Cornell, the very man he turned out of office. Was there ever such an exhibition of fawning sycophancy? such a contemptible groveling in the mire? such a licking of the hand that has not hesitated to smite them in the mouth on all occasions, both publicly and privately? No wonder the Turkey Gobbler struts and spreads wide his tail; he has a perfect right to do it, so far as his own party is concerned, but let him take care and not make too wide a sweep in his majestic tread, or he may perchance find himself more keenly galled and more completely plucked than he was some time ago by the gallant Lamar of Mississippi.

WHEN THIS CRUEL WAR IS OVER.

It is a pity that the war is not yet over. Two vast armies fought with a devotion and courage unparalleled in the annals of history for more than four years to establish and fix forever a great and vital political principle. Throughout the entire history of the country, the question had been a mooted one. The ablest lawyers, the most eminent and learned jurists and the greatest and wisest statesmen of the country held to different and conflicting opinions, and as a last resort an appeal was made to the arbitration of the sword. By the result of this appeal the question was forever settled so far as the soldiers and patriots and statesmen on either side were concerned. The war closed, and the people engaged in the strife were discharged from military duty, and returned to the peaceful avocations of daily life. Every energy was devoted to the repair of the fortunes and places made waste by the havoc of the strife.

That strife, which ceased more than fourteen years ago, when the decimated remnant of the most gallant army that ever faced death at the cannon's mouth laid down their arms in silent sadness at Appomattox, is yet alive with intense heat in the hearts of a large mass of an intolerant and vindictive North. While the South is making every effort to recover its lost property, to repair its waste places, to build up new enterprises, to develop the resources of the country and to give every possible impetus to im-

provement and progress, and have only asked that the rights and privileges accorded them by the laws of the country shall not be withheld, the partisan speakers of the North have made the atmosphere alive with alarm, as if the hosts of a defiant South were mustering to arms to repeat the conflict of '61-'65. Not a Republican speaker has mounted the stump during the present campaigns in that section, who has not made the old war cry his principal theme. Local aspirants for local positions have entirely ignored local affairs to indulge in helpful flings at the South. When national topics have been discussed, such direction has been given to language as to influence the minds of the hearers and arouse a solid North against a solid South. In the pulpit, in the press and on the rostrum they still treat us as enemies in arms, and it is only by appealing to all the vindictive passions of the masses that they retain their hold of power. We of the South have hoped that the war was ended. Soldiers of both armies have confessed that the conflict was over, but the leading spirits of evil at the North seem determined that there shall be no return to the joys and blessings of peace.

Montenegro is a unique country in regard to its postal business. Until lately the mails were not sent to any of the cities or villages, but every citizen had to go for his letters to the capital, Cetinje. There has now been established a postal department, and the mail is sent from Cetinje to four other cities. The mail carriers travel to these four cities on foot three times weekly.
