#### VEIWS AND REVIEWS.

The house at Gadshill which was occupied for years by Charles Dickens and under whose roof he died, was lately put up at auction.

The Mayor of Banbury, England, announces that, in view of the hard winter imminent, he shall give £100 to charities in the town, instead of eating it with the rest of the corporation at dinner.

Returns show a further serious falling off in the amount of silver plate manufactured in its land. In the year ending March, 1855, duty was paid on 994,360 oz; in 1879, on 740,239 oz; the decline being equal to a wholesale trade of about \$650,000 a year.

The report of Gen. Wright, chief of the engineer corps, has been forwarded to the Secretary of war. It is composed mainly of the reports of engineer officers that have already been published. He renews the remarks and suggestions made in his last report on the importance of · completing the fortifications of the seaport cities. In case of a foreign war an enemy in ten days could do injury to Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Norfolk, Charleston, New Orleans, San Francisco and other ciries tenfold greater than the cost of completing their fortifications at the present time.

Mobile, in a few weeks, will make the experiment of overcoming her inefficient snipping ficilities by mears of a steam ship, which has been built with particular reference to shallow waters. If this s'eamer proves a success, of course others will follow, and then the necessi y of sending all cotton for foreign ports by rail to New Orleans will be obviated. Mobile merchants are also exerting themselves to get appropriatious to deepen their harbor, so that all their wharves may become available for all sorts of shipping. The rivalry between the two cities of New Orleans and Mobile is likely t, stimulate both to a renewed and healthfu' activity.

Mr. Charles Francis Adams, Jr., is a man of large wealth, and his heavy inter ests in the West as well as in the East fit him to know pretty well the feeling of b issuess through the country. How much he believes in the 'boom' is to be inf rred from an address to the Indianapolis board of trade, in which he said : 'I am fully persuaded, from all I see as I go over this country, that at no time was it so pros perous as it is to-day, and that it is now going into a period of prosperity in the next ten or fifteen ye rs greater than it ever had before. I could go further and say that we were getting into a period of prosperity greater than any people ever saw before-a period when all these great causes that are now working here in this room, the combination of telegraphs and railroads and other appliances, have got to work with greater energy and produce greater results than we have ever dreamed of or seen any cause to dream of in past history.'

The battle of Torgan, fought by Fred. erick the Great in 1760, is well known to have been one of the most murderous. ly contested actions which has ever taken place, but until lately no trustworthy enumeration has ever been given of the killed, wounded, and missing on either side. In the last number of the Militar Wochenblatt, the organ of the German general staff, carefully prepared tables are published of the losses suffered by the several Prussian regiments of cavalry and battalions of infantry engaged, and from these it appears that the fifty-nine battalions which took part in the action, and which numbered altogether 26,000 officers and men, lot a total of 15,650 officers and men or about 60 per cent. of their aggregate effective. In the thirtynine battalions which fought under the personal direction and immediate orders of the King, the proportion of losses was even greater, so that, after the action, the five battalions of grenadiers had to be formed into one battalion, the remnants of six bat alions of two other regiments being also temporarily organized into one battalion. Of the 26,000 infantry soldiers who went into action, 3,350 were killed, 7,956 were wounded, and 3,130 were reported as missing. As a contrast to this terrible proportion of killed wounded, and missing, it may be mentioned that the loss at Gravelotte was only 1-11th of the whole number of troops engaged on both sides, at Worth and Mars-la-Thour 1-6th, at Spicheron 1 8th, at Koniggratz 1-15th only, and at Magenta and Solferino 1-11th.

#### THE NEW YORK TRIBUNE AND THE SOUTH.

It is fortunate, perhaps, that the New York Tribune has but a limited circulation in the South, and that its influence, even where it does diraulate, is still more limited. Its columns are continually filled with advice as to the course the South should pursue in all her relations of life-civil, social, domestic, financial and industrial-yet the advice is gotten up expressly to please the tastes and wishes of a northern market, and which, if followed, would bring ruin and disaster upon the section it is supposed to benefit.

The Tribune is entirely sectional, and caters only to the passions, prejudices and jealousies of those who esteem the South as a president Nazareth, from which no good a come. Every allusion which it makes regarding the South is to pander directly to the wishes of those who hate us and are jealous that we may become prosperous. All its advice is to further sectional selfishness -is entirely uncalled for-and will, as we trust, be entirely un. heeded by our people. The supreme im pudence of attempting to give direction to the affairs of a section for which it manifests only hatred, and for which it never s, cake a kindly nor encouraging word, is only equalled by the avidity with which its teachings are sought for by its partisan friends, and the supreme indifference with which they are trea ed here at the South.

The manufacturers of the North have recently become alarmed over the prospect of an inauguration of extensive manufacturing enterprises in this section of the country, and the T. ibune, catching the alarm, and wishing to pander to the desires of the greater portion of its readers, an l, at the sure tim , inflice a dose of its useless advice upon the South, comes out. in itsissue of the 3rd ultimo, with the gravest reasons why such enterprises should not be entertained for a moment in the minds of our people, and demon strating why such efforts would terminate A JOURNEYMAN PRINTER, who can in inevitable disaster. They are embodi ed in the following extract from is issue of the date named:

A great deal of foolish advice is be stowed on these communities by shortsighted persons, the burden of which is that they should start manufactories. There is at present little demand for in creased manufacturing facilities in the United States, and that little the North can speedily supply. It would be folly for Southern towns to attempt a feeble competition with the great Northern factories. Capital, skilled and organized labor, and competent managers are alike wanting, and if these could be obtained it would take years to get possession of profitable markets by crowding out the powerful interests already in possession of the field.

Anyone of ordinary perception can see

the animus which prompts the sentiments contained in the above and anyone who is at all acquainted with the success which has thus far attend ed the manufacturing enterprises of the South, will know that the postulate of the Tribune is unwarranted by the facts. It is not the fear that we shall fail; but, on the contrary, the certainty of our success, which causes alarm, and gives volition to such disintered (?) advice. The dividends declared by nearly all the principal cotton manufactories in the South for a number of years, have been very much larger than any mills of the North have ever been able to announce, and, to use a homely expression, "that is where the shoe pinches." There is every prospect that the South will soon become powerful in wealth, influence and population, through her manufactur. ing interests, and the North expects it. and the Tribure dreads it. No country in the world possesses such advantages as we have here at our very doors and there is no legitimate reason why we may not compete with the cotton spinners of any section. Locality, climate, cheapness of labor, the expense of living and means of transportation are all to our advantage, and, regardless of the croak ings of the Tribune and the clique which it represents, they will be utilized to the benefit of the South and to the damage of the North. It is one of the inevitable things in the affairs of men which the Tri bune cannot prevent, nor even hinder. The initiative has already been taken; its success has been demonstrated even under adverse circumstances, and no power on earth can now stay its progress.
