Among the jewels which M. Raspail wishes to have dispersed is a beautiful ruby cut into the form of a dragon with outspread wings. The pric less blue diamond of the regent, stolen in 1792, has never been heard of since. though there are jestelers who think they have found it in a magnificent stone belonging to an English nobieman of wealth.






