The Linkhaw-Hartman Case. The trial of Miss Amelia Linkhaw, for the murder of Mr. J. E. Hartman, is in progress at the Superior Court of Robeson county. Miss Linkhaw charged the deceased with seduction and upon his refusal to marry her, shot him at a hotel in Lumberton, Robeson county, about two years ago. Shortly after the fatal shot was fired Miss Linkhaw gave birth to a child which she claims is the fruit of criminal intercourse between herself and her victim. The case was called on Monday. Miss Linkhaw was conveyed to the Court House in a buggy, accompanied by her mother, who sat with her in the prisoner's box'. The prosecution established the fact that Miss Linkhaw did the shoots ing and a'so that the shot was the cause of the death of Mr. Hartman.

The State rested the case here and the defense called their wi nesses, about forty in number. Monday night there w.s an all-night session, and up to the time of the train passing Lumberton this morning, not one half of the witnesses had been examined. It is thought that the trial will hardly come to a close before Saturday. The defense will, it is said, endeavors to prove Miss Linkhaw's insanity and with this view have had summoned Drs.
