**Marine Disaster.**  
Brig Isis, Fish, (of Camden, Me.) from Navassa, Nov. 14th, with a cargo of 340 tons of phosphates, bound for this port, sprung a leak off the N. E. point of Inagua on the 21st ult. and bore up for Matthew Town; but the leak gained so rapidly and the crew became so exhausted that they were obliged to run ashore at Doran's Creek, about 15 miles from Matthew Town. The cargo will become a total loss, the vessel having five feet of water in her hold when beached and filling soon after.  
**North Carolina Medical Journal.**

Each applicant for a license to practice medicine will be examined in all these departments or branches of the science.  
We also notice in an editorial review of "Sanitary Engineering," a pamphlet issued by the North Carolina Board of Health, that the importance of a thorough system of disinfecting of all privies, vaults, cess-pools and, in fact, all places where material poisons may be apt to arise from decaying vegetable or animal matter, is earnestly advocated and urged. It is a matter of much importance to the health of our city, and we wish the pamphlet alluded to could be placed in the hands of every father and mother in Wilmington.
