The Register of Deeds has issued seven marriage licenses during the week, two of which were for white and five for colored couples.  
Mr. E. E. Burruss was elected a Trustee of the First Presbyterian Church, on the 18th inst., to supply the vacancy occasioned by the death of Mr. Eli Murray.  
There are a few happy people in this country and they comprise those who know nothing about the great financial question, and don't wish to know anything about it.  
Rev. Dr. Patterson will preach at Pike Church to-morrow morning and at Burgaw to-morrow night, but this will not prevent the regular services in St. John's Church to-morrow.  
Mr. T. S. Royster, of Henderson, has been engaged as a teacher in the Cape Fear Military Academy. He comes well recommended by President Battle, of the University, and the elder Mr. Horner.  
It is said that one of the excursionists who were in the city on Thursday was robbed that night, in front of the Market House, of every cent he had, with the exception of one dime. He had 60 cents before he went in and 10 cents after he came out. The strictest investigation failed to find the thief.

**City Court.**  
Two sailor men who gave their names as Jas. Jones and Jas. McIntire and who look to be about 25 and 30 years of age, were arraigned this morning upon a charge that looked from a reporter's standpoint very much like that of highway robbery. A seafaring man, who sails under the cognomen of James Fletcher, was the aggrieved party, and stated under oath that last night somewhere in the city—the exact locality he could not tell as he was a stranger in the place—shortly after dark, he was set upon by two men who held him and attempted to rifle his pockets, which they succeeded partially in doing when he cried out and they scampered off. To questions put by the Mayor the witness stated he was somewhat in liquor last night and had intended going off on the train to New York, where his baggage had preceded him, but that being too late for the train he missed the opportunity of going. He stated that he had some \$14 in money when he started down town, that the parties who robbed him got a portion of it and he had only \$2 left. The witness would not swear positively to the identity of the persons at the bar; he could not tell whether they were the same who robbed him or not.  
Officer Walker testified that last night about 11 o'clock Fletcher and the two prisoners at the bar were together near the corner of Dock and Front streets. The two seemed to be trying to get Fletcher to go aboard as one of them said, so he paid not much attention to them, supposing they were friends; but shortly after they had passed down Front street and he had turned towards Water street, heard cries of fire, murder and scotch; returning he saw two men coming running, whom with the assistance of officer Watkins he afterwards arrested and found to be the same parties whom he had a short time before seen with the man Fletcher. One of the prisoners, Jones, seemed very indignant about his arrest, and claimed that he knew the law and the rights of a citizen, but could not be induced to talk about the man whom the two had just been in company with. The witness testified that officer Watkins and himself then brought the arrested parties to the Guard House and locked them up. Officer Watkins being called to the stand corroborated this testimony in regard to the part he bore in the arrest.  
Three dollars and ten cents in money were found in possession of Jas. Jones who declared it was money that he had been paid off with on his vessel, the schooner Jennie F. Willey, last night. This defendant further stated that last night was the first time he had left his vessel since he arrived in port, some three weeks ago. The other defendant, James McIntire, has been in the city some three weeks, he stated, waiting to get a ship; came here from Charleston. The Mayor, reserved his decision and the prisoners were remanded to their cell. James Fletcher is held as a witness in the case.  
A Water Street grocery merchant was arraigned upon a warrant for non-payment of license tax, and also for failure to appear at the City Court yesterday in obedience to summons. The defendant rendered excuse that he mistook the hour, when the fine of \$5.00 which had been entered against him was remitted, and he was released upon payment of the costs, and producing City Treasurer's receipt for back taxes. The Court then adjourned.

**More Robbery.**  
Thieves have again visited Capt. S. W. Nobles, who lives just a few miles out of the city on the old Newbern road. This time they carried off a lot of geese and some fodder. Capt. Nobles says that the thieves are as severe on him and persons living in his vicinity as the old Moonlight Club was.  
**Magistrate's Court.**  
Isaac Baker, colored, was arraigned before Justice Mills this forenoon for an assault and battery upon John Johnson, colored. Judgment was suspended upon payment of costs.  
James Baker, colored, before the same Justice's Court, was arraigned for assault and battery upon the same defendant above named. Judgment was suspended upon payment of costs.  
**The Twins.**  
Isaac Baker and James, his brother who are better known as "The Twins," have again been in trouble, but this time it was in the Magistrate's Court that they figured instead of the City Court, the charge being assault and battery. Judgment was suspended and they were released upon payment of costs.
