Arrest of a Desperade.

Police officers Williams, Scharf, James and constables Nichelas N. Carr and deputy W. H. One or two pistol shots were fired at the fugitive as he was fleeing from house to house, but without eff ct. About the first words spoken by the captive to the captors after he was taken was to inform them, that but for the fact that he, Browa, alias Mack, had that day disposed of his pistol by selling it, he would have sold his life dearly before he would have been taken.

This no doubt the villian would have done as he is represented as being chargel with the crime of burglary and arson said to have been committed in Darlington District, S. C. Captain Brock, Chief of Police for this city, receiv d, some six months ago, a description of a party who had escaped from the clutches of the law at the above named place in South Carolina, which, it is thought, fits Brown werv nearly.
