Disastrous Fire at Rocky Point

We regret to learn that the gin house, cotton press, gnat mill, engine and eight bales of cotton on the premises of Messrs. Westbrook & Brothers, at Rocky Point were destroyed by fire last Saturday night. The loss will not fall far from \$3,000, and we learn that none of the property was covered by insurance. The cause of the fire is unknown, but it is supposed to have caught accidentally. The engine had been running during the day, and parties connected with the establishment were up as late as 11 o'clock and no fire was discovered when they left.

The prospect of light weather and a good run tempted out a large delegation of the fox club this morning. There were about fifteen in the saddle out of the forty members enrolled which, taking it all in all, was a good turnout. The run began at 4:30 o'clock and ended at 6:30, at which time Reynard was caught, and Capt. Bill Oldham had the brush. The run was a very exciting one; the fox, although young, was very crafty and doubled on his pursuers repeatedly and at one time ran so close to one of the members of the club, Mr. Forshoe, who had just dismounted, that that gentleman gave him a cut with his whip.

Complimentary.

Dr. P. L. Murphy, a son of the late Patrick Murphy, of this city, and a gentleman well and intimately known to several of our young men, has been complimented by an appointment as Assistant Physician of the Western Lunatic Asylum, located at Staunton, Va. Dr. A. M. Fauntleroy, of Staunton, was at the same time elected Superintendent. The election took place at Staunton, on the 11th inst, and there were twelve applicants for the position of Superintendent and fourteen for that of Assistant Physician. When it is stated that many of these were names of much prominence among the medical men of Virginia and other States, the compliment extended to Dr. Murphy in this election may be fully appreciated.

Arrest of a Desperado.

Police officers Williams, Scharf, James and constables Nicholas N. Carr and deputy W. H. Strode last night, under the guidance and direction of constable Carr, proceeded to a house in Straus' Alley, between Second and Third streets, over in Brooklyn, for the purpose of arresting one Robert Brown, alias Henry Mack, a descendant of Ham and an escaped criminal from South Carolina, whom the party supposed, from information in their possession, was lodging in the locality above named. The house was surrounded by the officers of the law, but the object of their search eluded their grasp for the time and escaped into an outhouse from which he escaped into another small house and was at last captured, by the pursuing party tearing a portion of the house away to reach him as he had secured himself temporarily by fastening the door on the inside. One or two pistol shots were fired at the fugitive as he was fleeing from house to house, but without effect. About the first words spoken by the captive to the captors after he was taken was to inform them, that but for the fact that he, Brown, alias Mack, had that day disposed of his pistol by selling it, he would have sold his life dearly before he would have been taken.

This no doubt the villain would have done as he is represented as being charged with the crime of burglary and arson said to have been committed in Darlington District, S. C. Captain Brock, Chief of Police for this city, received, some six months ago, a description of a party who had escaped from the clutches of the law at the above named place in South Carolina, which, it is thought, fits Brown very nearly.

The prisoner was conveyed to the Guard House last night and locked in a cell where he now is, and will remain until something can be heard from the authorities in Darlington, who were telegraphed to-day by the Chief of Police. The prisoner maintains a very sullen demeanor, but in reply to a question as to how long he had been in Wilmington said "two years, off and on." He claims to hail from Wilmington and is about 6 feet, 8 or 10 inches high, of stout build, is a ginger bread color and looks to be only 25 or 30 years of age.

Since the above was in type, Captain Brock has received a despatch from Sheriff W. P. Cole, of Darlington, stating that from description given, no doubt the party arrested here last night is Henry Mack, who is wanted in Darlington. Sheriff Cole requests Captain Brock to hold on to his prisoner until he can come with necessary papers.
