The cent was first proposed by Rob ert Morris, the great financier of the Revolution, and wasnamed by Jeffe son two ears after. It began to make its appearance from the Mint in 1792. It bore the bead of Washington on one side and thirten links on the ther. The French z volution soon created a r ge for French ideas in America, which put on the cent, instead of Washington, the head of the G ddess of Liberty a French liberty with neck thrust forward and flowing locks. The chain on the reverse side was displaced by the olive wreath of peace but the Fren h liberty was short-lived, and so was her portreit en our cent. The next head or figure that succeeded this the staid classic dame with a fillet around her hair-come into tashion about thirty or forty years ago, and her finely chiseled Greciau features have been but slightly altered by the lapse of time.

Oyster Soup.

are at their test, the following recipe for success. The object is, we understand making oyster soup will be of interest to to secure possession of the old Fair housekeepers:

Two quarts of oysters, three pints of Asociation, ner this city. new milk, three ounces of butter, one and one-half ounces of flour, salt and pepper to taste, and mace, if liked. Put the milk over boiling water; drain the oysters and put the liquor in a saucepan on the stove; wash the oysters and remove every particle of shell that may ad here to them. When the milk is hot add the butter and flour, rubbed smoothly together and thinned with a little of the milk, let it cook, stirring slowly, until slightly thickened; the liquor, which must be well boiled, skimmed and hot, may then be added, and after that the drained oysters. As soon as they are well puffed and the edges somewhat curl ed serve the soup. Half a pint of rich cream is a great improvement and may be used instead of the butter. Serve with them a plate of small crackers, crisped in
