A Postal Regulation.

The following provision of the United States postal law and regulations is worth remembering, particularly since the general government is somewhat positive about the observance of its laws: "No person shall transmit by private express or unlawful means, or deliver to any agent of such unlawful express or deposit, or cause to be deposited at an appointed place, for the purpose of being transmitted, any letter or packet; and for any such offence, the party offending shall be liable to a penalty of fifty dollars."
City Court.
George Brown, a white sailor tramp, having sought lodgings at the guard house last night, was locked up afterwards by the Night Janitor for handing a lighted paper to a prisoner in a cell and this morning arraigned upon the charge of disorderly conduct. The defendant pleaded ignorance of any violation of rules of the prison and asked to be discharged upon the grounds that he was promised work to-day. The Mayor after duly considering the matter finally concluded to release the prisoner and he was discharged.
Thomas Lawson, a young English sailor, charged with being drunk and down, was ordered discharged upon payment of costs. This exhausted the docket and the Court adjourned.
Magistrate's Court.
Tom Titt, the notorious little colored vagrant, who has been in the guard house as many times as he has seen years in this world, was arrested by a warrant from Justice McQuigg this forenoon for striking a boy with a rock over the eye. Being rather under the age for any responsibility for a violation of the statute law he was given over into the hands of the city authorities and locked up in the city prison for the present.
Jack Smith, alias Lewis Jones, colored, was arrested upon a warrant and arraigned before Justice McQuigg this morning on the charge of larceny, and committed in default of \$200 bail for trial on the 7th instant.

Belfry For The City Hall.
Innovations are the order of the day. Serious Cutting Affray.
A serious cutting affray, and one which will probably terminate fatally to the wounded man, took place last night in a negro cabin at the Belvidere plantation near this city. George Everett and his half brother, Bob Everett, became involved in an altercation about some meal when they fell to blows, and during the scuffle Bob ripped out a knife and severely cut George in the abdomen. As soon as the wounded man cried out he was put in a boat and brought to this city for medical attendance. Being late when he arrived and not knowing how to proceed, he was hauled about first from one place to another until he was left in the guard house. This morning he was carried to Dr. W. W. Lane, who rendered the necessary medical aid. The knife used is supposed to have had a blade about three inches long. The wound is about four inches in length and quite deep, the *omentum* commonly called "leaf fat," having been cut through and left protruding from the wound. He is now lying in Dr. Lane's office. As he has no money to hire a room, and there being no hospital or place of accommodation for cases of this kind in the city, Dr. Lane has permitted him to remain there rather than turn him out on the streets to die.
