death if the officer telephoned to Dr. Walker  
that his services were needed. The Doc-  
tor was promptly on hand and having  
applied the proper remedies, the officer  
again tried to elicit some information  
from the wounded woman in regard to  
the accident that had befallen her, but  
failing to get a satisfactory answer he  
brought the injured party to the Guard  
House. This morning she told the Chief  
of Police that it was a woman who cut  
her but she didn't know her name. The  
defendant was discharged.
