Bogus Gold Coins.
 The papers announce that a well-exe-
 cuted bogus half-eagle, or five-dollar gold
 piece, has just been put in circulation.

The officers of the United States Mint
 state that it is by far the best counterfeit
 that has ever come under their observation,
 and some of them have examined not a
 few. The genuine \$5 gold piece weighs
 129 grains; the spurious coin, when care-
 fully tested at the mint, showed a weight
 of 127½ grains—1½ grains light by the most
 delicately adjusted scales. Therefore the
 lightness of weight is not likely to be de-
 tected by the general public. To make
 the matter worse, the coating of gold on
 the imitation coin is thick enough to resist
 the tests of acids usually employed for the
 purpose.

By Telephone.
 We understand that there are now nearly
 one hundred and thirty subscribers to
 the Telephone Exchange, in this city. So
 popular has this means of communication
 proved since its recent introduction here
 that there are generally orders ahead
 which are received faster than the tele-
 phones, the manufacture of which is lim-
 ited, can be supplied. In addition to the
 number reported above there are others
 who will subscribe just as soon as those
 who are now waiting for telephones can
 be supplied. The instruments are on the
 way and are expected daily and will be
 placed in position just as soon as received.

We notice that our neighbors in Cher-
 lotte are talking telephon pretty strong
 just at this time. The *Observer* says
 that an experimental wire was put up
 on Saturday and the instrument attached
 and that the result was highly satisfac-
 tory, an incident which goes to prove
 that the telephone, literally, as well as
 metaphorically, speaks for itself.

There is one item of the benefit cor-
 ferred by the telephone, as illustrated
 here, which is sometimes lost sight of in
 the general use of the instrument, and that
 is its efficacy as a fire alarm. We have
 seen them thoroughly tested here. The
 alarm is located so promptly and so
 directly that in a few moments
 after a fire is discovered it can be known
 everywhere where there is telephonic
 communication, and the scene of the fire
 promptly located. This is an especial
 benefit and convenience to the business
 man as he can, by communicating with
 the City Hall or the Exchange, learn in
 a moment not only the direction and the
 district of the alarm but the exact spot so
 that, if it should be anywhere near his
 own residence he is at once advised of the
 fact and can rush off immediately to the
 scene. If it is not in his neighborho d
 he loses no time in running up street
 on the chance of finding the location from
 those he may meet.

There are eleven telephonic fire alarms

in this city and as a matter of general inter-
 est we publish here with the various loca-
 tions, which are as follows: At the resi-
 dence of Col. Roger Moore, Chief of the
 Fire Department, on Chestnut, between
 Front and Second streets; City Hall;
 Little Giant Engine House; Adrian En-
 gine House; Cape Fear Engine House;
 Gas House; Castle street, corner Seventh;
 Market street corner Seventh; Red Cross
 street corner Sixth; Fourth street, corner
 Fifth; Market street, corner Front.
