**Cane Grass: Reed Grass (Cynodon**  
Dactylon.)  
We notice in the February number of  
the *American Agriculturist*, and also in  
the Agricultural Report of 1878 from  
Washington, that Bermuda grass is at-  
tracting considerable attention as a  
forage grass. Seeds and roots are in  
demand from those who are attracted by  
the glowing accounts of its productiveness.  
In each of the works named, drawings of  
this grass are given, making the identity  
of the plant perfect as compared with  
the grass bearing the name of Bermuda  
grass and cane grass in our streets and  
by-ways and savannas.

Whatever this grass may prove to be  
elsewhere, it is not a crop-grass here, and  
from a study of its habits we do not see  
how it can be so utilized. Its great point  
of merit with us is that it grows thriftily  
in our poorest loose sandy soil, binding it  
together in dense sods and answering bet-  
ter in most locations as a lawn grass. It  
is propagated by setting the sod, and pro-  
tecting it for a few weeks from the pas-  
sing vehicles. The most successful way  
of transplanting is by knocking the sods  
in pieces, and separating the grass entire  
with a rake. In this condition, if cover-  
ed in trenches, the roots will strike deeply  
into a prepared soil, and give a more lux-  
uriant growth than by sodding.

**Operetta Friday Night.**

**Taken up Saturday Night.**  
There were two persons and one  
wheelbarrow taken up by our vigilant  
night police on Saturday night. The in-  
dividuals were tried and their cases dis-  
posed of this morning. But the wheel-

posed of yet that we know of, unless the  
officer who took it to the Guard House  
has tried to roll it back again to where it  
belonged. He would not have to carry  
it more than a stone's throw either, so we  
are informed.

**Interesting Occasion.**  
Rev. G. B. Taylor, D. D., of Rome,  
Italy, delivered on yesterday morning, at  
the First Baptist Church, a very impres-  
sive address concerning the Italian Mis-  
sion, which is conducted under the aus-  
pices of the Southern Baptist Conven-  
tion. He gave a succinct and interesting  
account of the various stations in different  
portions of Italy and Sardinia, over which  
he has a general supervision, also a de-  
scription of the Evangelists stationed at  
those points. Dr. Taylor has been in Italy  
about seven years and expects to return  
to his field of labor in the course of a few  
weeks. He is just recovering from a se-  
vere attack of illness, and came to our  
city to visit his brother, Rev. J. B. Tay-  
lor. We learn that he will leave in the  
course of two or three days.

**Thrown from a Buggy and Badly**  
Injured.  
This morning, about 11 o'clock, Doctors  
W. G. and G. G. Thomas were thrown  
from a buggy and seriously injured. The  
horse attached to the buggy became  
frightened near the corner of Front and  
Orange streets and started off in a brisk  
run up Front street. At the corner of  
Dock the reins broke and the buggy was  
turned over, throwing the occupants on  
the Belgian stones with which the street  
is paved. The two gentlemen were pick-  
ed up and carried to the office of Messrs.  
Adrian & Vollers, where surgical assist-  
ance was rendered. Dr. W. G. Thomas  
was injured about his right thigh and re-  
ceived some bruises about the body. Dr.  
G. G. Thomas' arm was sprained and his  
face badly gashed. It is a wonder that  
both were not killed. The buggy was very  
badly broken. We trust that the injuries  
sustained by the gentlemen will not prove  
to be as severe as is now supposed.

**City Court.**  
A son of the Emerald Isle, who had  
taken "a wee drap too much of the crath-  
ur" on Saturday night, was arraigned this  
morning charged with disorderly con-  
duct, loud and boisterous cursing and  
wholesale abuse of city officials. In con-  
sequence of its being the first offence,  
the Mayor laid on \$5 or ten days in the C. P.  
Isaac Baker's name was the next case  
on docket which was read out by the  
Clerk, and thereupon one of the famous  
twin Baker brothers, a sable-hued indi-  
vidual who closely resembles the end  
man in the Ethiopian Minstrels, stepped  
to the front. He was charged with in-  
vading the private premises of a citizen  
living on Second street and using abusive  
language, besides refusing to leave when  
ordered off the premises. The Mayor  
sentenced the defendant to pay \$20 fine  
or remain thirty days in the City Prison.  
In default of payment of the fine the  
defendant went below.

A retail merchant being arraigned upon  
a warrant for failing to pay his license  
tax, handed over the delinquent tax and  
thus procured his release. This ended the  
proceedings of the Mayor's Court for the  
26th day of January, A. D., 1880.
