MR. PARNELL AGAIN.

The members of the House, as it was shown last night, had no curiosity to hear what Mr. Parnell might have to say, for, except Speaker Randall, who seems to have held himself officially obliged to be present, and Mr. S. S. Cox, none of them seem to have taken the trouble to go to his meeting.

A BOOM FOR GRANT.

The Pennsylvania Republican State Convention met at Harrisburg yesterday and by a vote of 133 to 113, instructed their delegates to cast their votes for Grant at the Chicago National Convention next June.

spoken competitors. As Secretary of the Treasury, he has a controlling influence under his charge which neither of the others possess, and every one who knows aught of his antecedents, knows that he will use that formidable influence to its utmost to gain his purpose.

WASHINGTON, D. C. Feb 3d, 1890.
