Deutsch, the Nihilist, who on being surprised by the Russian police in S P tersburg on Friday night, shot himself dead was one of the principal leaders of the revolutionary movement in Russia. He was known to be concerned in two murders and was suspected of complicity in the recent attempt to blow up the Imperito Moscow. Deutsch was a man of extra ordinary resources and great courage. He was one of the principal contributors to the revolutionary journal, Land and Lib erty, and undoubtedly supplied a large proportion of the brains and energy of the Nihilist Propaganda. His death will prove a severe blow to the cause and will doubt less tend to allay the Czar's apprehensions of sud len death.

COTTON SIMPLING.

The New York Cotton Exchange has recently passed a resolution about the "systematic robbery so long prevalent in the full names of the ladies have been that city," from the cotton bales sent to that market. The plunder real zed in this way the World says amounts to two hundred thousand dollars a year. The modus operandi is explained by detectives employed in investigating the frauds

A sampler c.n samp'e two hundred bales of cotton a day, the practice being as stated to steal about a pound and a hall from every bale. They have two bags beside them, into one of which they put the brokers' samples and into the other their own perquisites. When their own bag becomes sufficiently heavy they al train in which the Czar was journeying take it under their arm and go into a bar-room to take a drink apparently. Instead of doing so, however, they pass brough into a cellar or a warehouse adand in others the latter as the detectives have discovered. Here they deliver the cotton, it is weighed and they receive a slip marked with the weight and the amount of money they are entitled to receive. It is need. less to say that the dealer in stolen cotton never pays quite as much as the market price for it. The sampler then returns to the bar-room, where the bar-keeper cashes the check which is presented to him. Then the customer, by a sort of implied rule, is obliged to take a drink and pay for it. There are dozens of these shops where the stolen cotton is bought. and Messrs. Mooney & Boland have tracked them all and made their report to the Cotton Exchange. Some of their proprietors have grown rich at the business. Some have been indicted and arrested and are now out on bail. When the receivers accumulate sufficient quantities of the stolen cotton it is packed into baies and sold in the regular market.


