Struck by a Falling Sign.
We regret to learn of a very serious accident to Mr. James E. Orrell this morning. He was sitting in a chair in front of his office at the foot of Market street, a few feet from where a large signboard of the steamer yacht *Passport* was hanging when it was blown from the hook, or which it hung. Mr. Orrell saw one end give way and attempted to move, but just as he arose from his chair the other end gave way, falling on Mr. Orrell's head and knocking him down. The injuries inflicted are severe but are not necessarily dangerous. He was carried to his home and medical aid called to dress and examine the wound.

Let Wilmington be the Place.
The suggestion of the *Kinston Journal*, to hold the Democratic State Convention in Wilmington, has been endorsed by nearly all the eastern papers as well as many from the Western part of the State, to say nothing of the Cape Fear regions which of course are a unit for the city by the sea. Our Raleigh friends are modest, unselfish, hard workers; we don't think, as some appear to, that the Raleigh influence would be unduly exerted to influence the action of the convention. We do not favor leaving Raleigh for any consideration of this kind, but put the old plan of rotating as to place in vogue again, and can't think of any more suitable or central place for it than Wilmington.—*Goldboro Messenger*.

They are Coming.
The river between this city and Fayetteville is said to be 'chock-full' of rafts on their way to this place. There are all sorts in the lot—rafts of turpentine, rafts of tar, rafts of timber and rafts of wood. In all it is estimated that there are about two hundred between this place and Fayetteville. This may be an excessive estimate, but the pilot of the steamer *Ware*, which arrived here this morning, says that he counted over one hundred last night. About twenty of these rafts are from above Fayetteville and the balance from along the banks of the river between the two cities and from streams which empty into the Cape Fear.

How Lent Must be Observed.
The following regulations for Lent will be observed in the Catholic churches in this vicinity and all through the Diocese of North Carolina:

(1) All the faithful who have completed their twenty-first year are, unless legitimately dispensed, bound to observe the fast of Lent. (2) They are to make only one meal a day, excepting Sundays. (3) The meat allowed on fast days is not to be taken till about noon. (4) Flesh meat and fish is not to be used at the same meal during Lent. (5) A small refreshment, commonly called collation, allowed in the evening not to exceed the fourth part of an ordinary meal. (6) It is permitted to use bread, butter, cheese, eggs, milk, and all kinds of fruits, salads, vegetables and fish at the collation. (7) General usage has made it lawful to take in the morning some warm liquid, as tea, coffee or thin chocolate made with water, and a mouthful of bread. (8) Necessity and custom have authorized the use of lard, instead of butter, in preparing painted food. (9) The following persons are exempted from the obligations of fasting: Persons under twenty-one years of age, the sick, nursing women, those who are obliged to do hard labor, all who, through weakness, cannot fast without great prejudice to their health. (10) Dispensal in the use of fish meat may be allowed at all meals on Sundays, and on a day on Mondays, Thursdays and Saturdays, with the exception of Holy Thursday and the second and last Saturdays of Lent. (11) The faithful are reminded that besides the obligation of fasting imposed by the Church, this holy season of Lent should be, in an especial manner, a time of earnest prayer, of sorrow for sin, of ascension from the world and its amusements, and of generous almsgiving. (12) The Paschal time extends from the first Sunday of Lent till Trinity Sunday, during which time all Catholics who have attained the use of reason are bound to prepare themselves to receive worthily the Holy Communion. The holy season of Lent is a very proper time also, for children to go to their first confession, which they ought to do generally when about seven years of age. Parents should see to this.

Will Col & Aug. R. R.
At a meeting of the stockholders of the Wilmington, Columbia & Augusta R. R. held in this city and at Florence, a Board of ten Directors were elected as follows: Col. R. R. Bridgers, of Wilmington; Col. H. B. Short, of Columbus; Messrs. W. T. Walters, B. F. Newcomer, S. M. Shoemaker, Enoch Pratt, George S. Brown and Thomas C. Jenkins, of Baltimore; J. D. Cameron, of Pennsylvania, and H. B. Plant, of New York.

Net Incomes.
In only 28 counties out of the 93 in the State have there been any net incomes returns. Of this 28 New Hanover leads the van, returning more than twice as much as Mecklenburg or Halifax and three times as much as Wake. New Hanover gives in \$55,234; Halifax, \$21,553; Mecklenburg \$21,015, and Wake \$18,164. Orange county gives \$11,400; Wayne, \$5,976; Craven, \$4,098; Nash, \$4,016; Caswell, \$2,880; Cabarrus, \$2,553; Chowan, \$2,500; Edgecombe, \$2,450; and Franklin \$2,000. From this, the list runs down to \$50, which is all that is given in by Northampton and which is less than one-hundredth part of that given in by New Hanover.

Bank of New Hanover.
The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Bank of New Hanover was held at their banking house in this city yesterday afternoon.

Mr. W. T. Faircloth was elected President and Mr. H. Brunhill Secretary.

The meeting was called to order by the President, and on motion Messrs. J. W. Atkinson and D. K. McRae were appointed a committee to ascertain the amount of stock represented.

The committee reported that 6,265 shares of stock were represented, in person and by proxy, which being a majority the meeting was declared duly organized.

The President submitted a report regarding the operations and standing of the Bank, which was read and approved.

The following gentlemen were elected as the Board of Directors for the ensuing year: Messrs. C. M. Stedman, R. R. Bridgers, D. R. Murchison, John Dawson, J. W. Atkinson, D. McRae, J. A. Leak, E. B. Burden, Isaac Bates.

The meeting then adjourned.

The Census Enumerators.

There have been frequent inquiries of late as to the size of the districts over which each enumerator, acting under the supervisors of census, would have charge. We have published before some extracts from an official letter on the subject, but now reproduce them. The letter is to the supervisors of the census: "In general, every town, township, military district or other permanent civil division of the country should be constituted an enumeration district, if the estimated population thereof exceeds seven or eight hundred inhabitants. The only reason which this office could recognize as sufficient for making such a civil division a part of a larger enumeration district would be the impossibility of securing a competent and trustworthy enumerator within its own limits. The enumeration district must be made small enough to secure the completion of the canvass within the limit set by the census law, viz: during the month of June. To this end supervisors will be expected to exercise their best judgment in good faith. Compliance with the law in this matter will be insisted on." We clip this from the *Wilmington Observer* as a matter of interest to the people of this section.

Grand Lodge Knights of Pythias.
The delegates from this city who were in attendance at the Grand Lodge K. of P. at Fayetteville, returned home this morning much pleased with their trip and the hospitality of the good people of Fayetteville. The proceedings of the Grand Lodge were harmonious and the reports of the financial officers showed that the Order is in a much more prosperous condition than ever before. Mr. W. A. Guthrie was chosen representative to the Supreme Lodge which meets at St. Louis during the month of September. Goldsboro was chosen as the place to hold the next session of the Grand Lodge, which will convene on the second Tuesday of February, 1881.
