Meeting at Burgaw.
A meeting of the citizens of Pender county was held at Burgaw on the 9th inst., to take into consideration the question of building a court house. Col. John D. Powers was called to the chair, and T. J. Armstrong, Esq., was requested to act as Secretary. The meeting being declared duly organized, Dr. R. T. Sanders and Col. John D. Powers made able and eloquent speeches in favor of immediate action in the matter, while Drs. S. S. Stachwell and E. Porter strenuously opposed any action involving increased taxation until the present indebtedness of the county has been materially reduced. Dr. Porter offered the following resolution, which was adopted:
Resolved, That in the opinion of this citizen's meeting, it would be inexpedient to take any active measure at present looking to taxation for the building of a court house.
The meeting then adjourned.

Mr. Best and the W. N. C. R. R.
Mr. W. J. Best, the advance agent of the syndicate which proposes buying out the Western North Carolina Railroad, is in the city, trying to convince our people that it is all for the interest of Wilmington to let a foreign corporation own the connecting link between this city and the great West, and that there is no possible danger of Wilmington suffering from such a transaction as the sale of the W. N. C. R. R. Oh! no; certainly not. Why, possibly, the purchasers will come on down to Wilmington and buy several sites here for the erection of grain elevators in anticipation of an immense grain trade that will flow in from our seaport town from Chicago and the great Northwest—just as soon as the sale of the W. N. C. R. R. is completed, and is mortgaged to the State for payment. Why, how dull Wilmingtonians are not to see what a self sacrificing piece of business these people are willing to perform, and all merely for the good of Wilmington and—to get possession of the W. N. C. R. R. Oh, why will people be so blind to their own interests? Of course the syndicate don't want to make any money out of the operation; their action is all prompted through love for North Carolina; they want to see the great mineral wealth of the Old North State developed and it is perfectly natural, you know, for a foreign corporation to take more interest in the development of the State than native citizens who own largely in real estate. This question ought to be conceded at once, it is too absurd for discussion.

The Latest Rumor.
On last Wednesday afternoon, after the REVIEW had appeared on the streets with the announcement that the Board of Directors of the Western North Carolina R. R. had refused to entertain a proposition for its sale, a gentleman in this city offered to bet \$100 that, notwithstanding the action of the Board of Directors, Gov. Jarvis would call the Legislature together for the very purpose that the Board had refused to sanction. There were no takers then and there are none now. It is, we think, very probable that the Legislature will be called together; in fact, we think it more than probable as, in our opinion, it is a foregone conclusion. Our good friend of the Raleigh *Clover* is again our authority. We quote from its yesterday's issue:
"There is a current street rumor that the Legislature is to be convened anyway. It is known that the proposition to purchase the Western road was submitted to the Board of Directors, and that on the question of recommending the calling of the General Assembly they stood six to six. Director Shober, who was not present, favoring the plan. It is also known that on the question the Board of Internal Improvements was in like manner divided in opinion, Col. Wm. Johnston opposing, and Capt. C. M. Cook favoring it. It is now asserted by many people as their belief that the Governor will put the proposition before his advisors, the Council of State. This body is composed of the Secretary of State, Treasurer, Attorney-General, Auditor, and Superintendent of Public Instruction. By the law these are constituted the advisors of the Governor, before whom shall be laid all matters of public moment on which advice is needed. The Governor cannot convene the Legislature unless by the advice and consent of the Council of State. Section 9 of the constitution of the State provides: 'The Governor shall have power, on extraordinary occasions, and with the advice of the Council of State, to convene the General Assembly in extra session by his proclamation, stating therein the purpose or purposes for which they are thus convened.'"

Report of the Grand Jury.
The following is the report of the Grand Jury at the present term of the Criminal Court in regard to the condition in which they found the Poor House and County Jail:

STATE OF NORTH CAROLINA }
New Hanover County. }

The Grand Jury of the Criminal Court, February term, 1880, having visited the County Poor House and Jail make the following report:

We found the grounds and buildings of the Poor House in a cleanly condition; the buildings in good repair; furniture, particularly the bedding, deficient; the cook room, cooking utensils and dining room in good order; the store room well supplied with good and wholesome provisions. The inmates are as follows:

Insane, white—males, 1; colored, males, 3; females, 6. Paria-sons—white, males 2; females, 3; colored, males, 12; females, 4. Pira-sons—colored, males, 3; females, 1. Total, 35.

They appear to be well cared for, with the exception of bedding, which is not as good as we believe it should be, and we suggest that the County Commissioners call the Superintendent's attention to this matter.

The Jail was found to be in good condition and the Janitor, Daniel Howard, deserves commendation for the manner in which he takes care of the prisoners and jail.
