Latest Cable News.

London Feb. 19 .- The St Petersburg correspondent New York Herald telegraphs that the explosion in the Winter Palace occurred at 6 oc ock The walls of the cellar and guard room were demolished, killing ten and wounding sixty of the body guard. Tue floor and furniture of the dining room were destroyed. The Czar's usual dining hour is six. It is supposed that a dynamite clock was used like that of Thomassen; of Bremerhaven. There is great excitement here in London. The Daily News' correspondent says that a connection has been established between the attempt and the arrest of forty inmates of the palace the very day before the explosion, and adds that if this is so the plot must have been most deliberately planned and executed under circumstances of the greatest audacity, as though in defiance of the said arrests. The correspondent says that it is very difficult to obtain reliable information and still more difficult to telegraph it. A special service has been beld here at the Russian chapel in Welbeck street. The Duke of Edinburgh was present, with Prince Lobanoff and the German, Austro Hungarian and other ambassadors In the House of Commons to-day Lord Hartington asked for further information respecting the attempt on the life of the Czar. The Chancellor of the Exchequer said he was unable to add anything to what was already known The news, he said, had been received with the utmost borror. He express ed his satisfaction at the providentia e-cape of the Czar, and said that the health of the Czar, the Empre-s and the Duchess or Edinburgh had not been affected by the excitement attending the explosion in the Winter Palace. In the Upper House Lord Beaconsfield said that the Duches, of Edinburgh, who is now in St Petersburg, refused to quit the scene of s much domestic suffering.


