#### Run Down.

The Nor. barque Fram, hence, fer Glasgow, which was found bottom up and towed into Lamlash Bay, has been lifted up so far that it has been ascertained that she was run down. The Difference. The Charlotte Observer asserted a few days ago that Charlotte had sent a larger sum to the Irish Relief Fund than any ether place in the State. # Arson the Accused in Jail.

Henry Cruse, colored, who is charged with larceny and arson, had aperliminary hearing this morning in both cases, before Justice T. M. Gardner, and was committed to jail without bail. Cruse is charged with setting fire a year or so ago to the residence of Mr. John A. Sanders about four miles from this city on the Old Plank read. He is also charged with stealing furniture and crockery from the residence before he set fire to it. The stolen furniture, crockery etc., were produced in Court and identified by Mr.

Sanders. The evidence is "bang up" against the prisoner. Cruse and his wife, it seems, have not been getting along very well together of late, and a day or two ago they came to blows and he cut at her with a knife. The wife then in a spirit of retaliation divulged all she knew about the larceny and arsen, and her testimony has been corroborated by tangible proofs in the way of stolen articles which were taken from Cruse s by officer Carr, who was empowered to do so by a search war

### Rocking Houses.

The practice of rocking houses and tearing down fences in some localities of this city during the night, has increased to an alarming extent. If the practice is the result of thought lessness, the offenders should be apprehended and made to understand that such thoughtlessness will not be tolerated.
