VIEWS AND REVIEW.

In a canvass of the representative men of Ohio the Cincinnati Enquirer claims that Hendricks and Blaine are the favorite Presidential candidates.

Gen. Longstreet supports Grant for another term, and believes that he and the only of Republican candidates can carry North Carolina, Louisiana and Georgia.

Three thousand Germans took part in the anti-third term meeting in New York Monday evening, and the expressions against Grant were of the most emphatic character.

The San Francisco News Letter says the month of January has been one of the dullest within our remembrance in nearly all trade departments. Business does not revive, nor does the 'boom' continue as predicted.

An Ottawa correspondent writes that Speaker Macpherson having caught serious cold by Jining at Rideau Hall, the residence of Lord Lorne, in silk stockings, another Speaker will have to be appointed, as there is no provision for a Deputy Speaker.

A young man at Omaha did not wish to marry the girl to whom he was engaged but she would not release him until he gave her his grocery business as a recompense. She now runs the store, while he works elsewhere on small wages, and the bargain pleases both.

The singular phenomenon has been frequently observed in the mountainous parts of Switzerland, Baden, Bavaria, and elsewhere in Europe, in the course of the current winter, that it has been generally warmer in the elevated districts, on the hills and mountains, than in the plains and valleys.

The Spanish Government has ordered the restoration to the parents, with a view to its reinterment as a Protestant, of the body of a child at Bilbao, whom the priest had compulsorily buried as a Catholic, on the ground of his having baptized it prior to the father's conversion to Protestantism.

The Vesuvius railway promises to be soon an accomplished fact. A portion of the rails are already laid, and a number of workmen are daily engaged upon the work. The railway starts from a point situated to the west of the observatory, on that side of the cone which is least seldom subject to streams of lava.

Capt. Webb, the Channel swimmer, has undertaken to swim sixty consecutive hours, six, for three days and two nights. He will be allowed to leave the water for not more than thirty minutes in each twenty-four hours. The attempt will be made under the most favorable circumstances possible, viz., sea water of summer temperature, and in London early in March.

A literary curiosity has just been published at Amsterdam. It consists of three short stories, possessing the peculiarity that in each of them only one vowel is employed, in the first a, in the second e, and in the third o, according to which the stories are entitled "A-Saga," "E-Legende," "O-Sprook." In the Dutch language only would such a feat be possible.

About thirty dealers were arrested in Philadelphia, on Saturday, at the instance of officers of the Produce Exchange, charged with selling oleomargarine under the pretence that it was butter. A test case is to be tried immediately. An act of the Legislature imposes a penalty of \$100 for selling oleomargarine unless it is distinctly marked so. It is also declared a misdemeanor, punishable by fine or imprisonment, or both.

The true version of the story about Prince Bismarck and the "boulders" is the following: The German Chancellor once said in one of his familiar discourses: "In politics (quand je fais la politique) I act as I do out duck shooting—I put my foot on one boulder, and do not take it off till I see my way to another. When I do, I step on to the new boulder, and leave the old one behind; and so on until I am out of the marsh." This seems a very apposite illustration of the Chancellor's. Austria was his boulder in the case of Denmark; France was his boulder in stalking down Austria; Russia was his boulder when France was to be beaten—and he is probably now looking out for a new boulder to defeat somebody else. The awkward part of it, too, is that he not only leaves his old boulder behind, but he kicks it over in his next step.

THE OBSERVER'S CHARGES.

The Editor of the Review has just returned to the city, after an absence of nearly two weeks, to find, among other things, an attack upon himself and his paper in the columns of the Raleigh Observer of the 16th inst., an attack which we have no hesitation in characterizing as unmanly and uncalled for, and as unworthy of the Editor of the Observer and of our past cordial relations, extending for a life-time.

We have made no charges against the Observer—not one—but on the contrary the attack was made by that paper on the REVIEW, and all because we dared to have an honest opinion of our own and to fearlessly express it. Our charge was against Gov. Jarvis, not, as an individual but in his official capacity, and in all that we said we bore in mind well that we may yet have to support and vote for him as the Democratic nominee for Governor of the State, as we certainly shall do should he receive the nomination, an assertion, however, which it is hardly necessary for us to give, least of all to the Editor of the Raleigh Observer. In all that we have said there was not one word intended to apply to any one of the Senators or Representatives from this State in Congress, and any assertion to the contrary is absolutely and unqualifiedly false, come from whence it may.

The attempt on the part of the Editor of the Observer to impeach the fidelity of the Editor of the REVIEW to the Democratic party in North Carolina cannot succeed. We feel justified in saying that our past record is as pure as that of any one of our competitors, whether he reside in Raleigh or in Wilmington, and it has not been done, either, for reward or the hope of reward. We have never asked for, and never held, and never expect to ask for, and never expect to hold, any place of political profit or preference. When work was to be done, we were there, but when the rewards of the success which our labors had assisted to achieve were dealt out, we have never been found in the front among the clamorous multitudes. Can the Editor of the Observer say as much?

We claim that the interest and honor of North Carolina are as dear to us as to any man living within the limits of the State, and no man shall dare impugn or question our patriotism. In all that we have said and in all that we have written in regard to this railroad question we have held this interest and this honor second to none other and it is because we have dared to urge the claims of our own section and our own people as against the encroachments of capitalists from other States that we have been thus taken to task.

That there are other citizens of the State who know the interests of Wilmington better than the Editor of the REVIEW, we freely admit, but we must beg leave to suggest that they don't live in Raleigh, and that they are not wont to think that the State of North Carolina is bounded on the North by the Raleigh & Gaston R. R., on the South by the North Carolina Division of the R. & D. R. R., on the one side by Vinegar Hill, and on the other by Hell's Half-Acre.

We trust that we shall not be called upon to say any more in reference to this matter. The discussion of such a question cannot be conducive to the interests of either the REVIEW or the Democratic party in the State. But—we will not be crowded.

As for the sale of the Western North Carolina R. R. we shall probably have but little to say hereafter. The matter has gone beyond the scope of newspaper influence. We have protested against the call of the Legislature at this time, but the protest has been unheeded. Our desire from the first has been that the call should not be made but that the matter might be left open to the people for instructions to their representatives at the regular session in January next. But, the call has been made and, as we said in our first article on the subject, so say we now, "if the people say sell the road, why then, sell it and remove this bone of contention from the path of the people and of the party in this State."

On the 9th of October a Paterson, N. J. schoolboy mailed the following postal card which is self-explanatory: '7 P. M. PATERSON, Oct. 9 '79. Will the postmaster of each place designated here please forward this with the most despatch together with a request to the postmaster of the next following place to re-mail it, and continue until it reaches San Francisco, when the postmaster is requested to mail it to

L. B. GARRIDE, Paterson, New Jersey, U. S. A. (London, Paris, Marseilles, Suez, Aden, Bombay, Calcutta, Hong Kong, Yokohama and San Francisco.) The card returned to the sender on the 27th inst., covered all over with postmarks. These show that the time occupied in going from place to place was as follows:
