DEAD MEN MADE TO BREATHE.

A Ghastly Experiment with the Bodies of Maj. Pugh's Murderers—Heat and Electricity Applied, Making the Pulses Beat and the Limbs Twitch as if Alive.

The execution of John Hall and Burrell Smith for the murder of Major Pugh was witnessed by a crowd numbering thousands. A feature never to be forgotten by those who witnessed it was the display of devotional sentiment of the wild, fantastic, exuberant sort common among negroes, on the scaffold, and during the few hours previous to the execution.

As the rope was cut Smith fainted and fell, which gave him an awkward fall, causing him to writhe in agony at the end of the rope. Hall died easily. After they had been suspended for seventeen minutes they were cut down and Dr. Sieger, of Nashville, and Drs. Byrne and Murfee, of this city, attempted the experiment in resuscitation which was proposed some days ago.
