## The Eleventh Anniversary.

The Wilmington Steam Fire Engine Company, No. 1, celebrated the eleventh anniversary of their organization by an engine practice this afternoon. They played a stream from the river at the foot of Dock street up to Second street and from thence to Market street, making a distance of 1,100 feet, and from the time the steamer left the engine house and she had her hose reeled out and a stream playing through it, was just six minutes, which is said to be the shortest time on record.

## For Congress.

So far as is known but three actual candidates for the Democratic nomination for member of Congress from this district have been announced. These are Hon. A. M. Waddell, recent incumbent, Maj. Chas. M. Stedman and Hon. A. A. McKoy. It has been known for some time past that Maj. Stedman and Col. Waddell were in the field but it has only recently been understood that Judge McKoy's name will be used. The first positive intimation that we have had that this last named gentleman was in the field, was derived from the Goldsboro *Messenger's* Clinton correspondence and we publish the clipping on the second page of this issue as furnishing information on a matter of general interest at this time.—Besides the three names mentioned above we have heard others spoken of. Maj. McClammy's friends in Pender county are urging his name, Mr. J. G. Scott, of Onslow, it is said wants it and so, we understand, does a Baptist preacher in Sampson county, Rev. J. L. Stewart, who, in addition to being a minister of the Gospel is also an excellent lawyer. We have also heard mentioned Col. H. B. Short and Capt. John W. Ellis, of Columbus, and Maj. Jas. C. McRae, of Fayetteville, not as actual candidates for the nomination but as possible dark horses. Previous to the bringing forward of Judge McKoy's name by his friends, the contest had undoubtedly narrowed itself to two candidates, Messrs Waddell and Stedman but what effect Judge McKoy's appearance on the course will have we are unable to judge.

Of course the REVIEW has no preference and no candidate of its own. We will most gladly support any one of those named as the nominee of the Democratic party and our only regret will be that we can't vote for all of them for Congress.

## His Imperial Majesty.

E. Techan, Esq., Imperial Consul at this port for Germany, held a reception at the Consulate this morning in honor of the eighty-third anniversary of the birth of His Majesty, William IV, King of Prussia and Emperor of Germany. The Consul's flag was run up on the flagstaff over the Consulate at an early hour this morning, while the several German vessels in port made a display of all their bunting. Many calls were made at the Consul's office to offer a sentiment of congratulation upon the happy day and to wish that His Imperial Majesty may live to see still another anniversary, and as many more as in the wisdom of Providence He may see fit to bestow upon the humane and benevolent old monarch. Several German Captains who were among the callers sang the national anthem of the Fatherland while the jingle of glasses and the popping of corks made music pleasant to the ear and to fascinating to the palate, and all went merrily as a marriage bell.
