Adjourned Meeting of Citizens.

The meeting of citizens of Wilmington, to consider the sale of the W N C R R, which adjourned on Friday evening from the rooms of the Produce Exchange to meet in the City Court room at 4 o'clock on Monday afternoon, met in adjourned session yesterday afternoon, pursuant to adjournment, to receive the report of the committee appointed to draft resolutions

The meeting was called to order by A H Van Bokkelen, Esq. Chairman. The Chairman then stated the object of the meeting to be to receive the report of the committee on resolutions.

Col Wm L DeRosset, Chairman of the Committee, handed a series of resolutions to the Secretary who read them aloud before the meeting.

The esolutions were then discussed and an amendment offered to resolution No. 5, which was adopted.

Mayor Fishblate was in favor of the sale of the railroad now, and on the proper terms, but he oppose i the sale on the

Best proposition. The Chairman then invited general discussion upon the subject, stating that although there were few present he thought they represented the interests of Wilmington. Col. Wm L. Smith opposed the sale of the road; he thought it was disgrace to Wilmington and a disgrace to North Carolina that the oad should be so'd. The Secretary of State had written a letter calling the attens of the people to taxes which they were compelled to pay signs,' in reference to completing said to sustain this road. He didn't suppose that such a matter had ever occurred to the citizens of Wilmington, and he looked ment. He thought that Wilmington ought to be able to build the road. He had known of enterprises started here where \$150,000 had been lost and parties immediately squared up and began anew. He thought we might find possibly more capitalists here.

Col. Reger Moore followed Col. Smith and endorsed Col. S.'s position. Col. Moore said he objected to the resolutions because Mr. Geo. F. Tilley offers to the public he thought they contained a covert meaning to sell the road to Mr. Best. He was not oppose I to the sale of the road now. as it seemed to be a foregone conclusion, but he objected to the sale except upon the very best terms, with all the proper safeguards and guarantees that could be thrown around it.

Mr. Don MacRae, in reply to Col. Moore, said that he was in favor of the sale, because he thought it best to dispose of all the roads and get them out of the hands of politicians. He was not in favor of any particular proposition unless it was for the best interests of the State.

The Chair then stated, as there seemed to be such an objection to the name of Best, as well as the Best proposition, that he proposed an amendment to the resolutions which said that the road should be sold to the best advantage and that the phraseology should be so changed as to read that the road be disposed of on the most advantagous terms.

Mr. Junius Davis and Mr. A. T. London participated in the discussion of the resolutions and Mr. DuBrutz Cutlar advocated them warmly, making a speech in support of them.

Mr. O. G. Parsley, Sr., having jus arrived in the meeting, requested that the resolution be read again. Col. DeRosset then read the resolutions over and Mr. Parsley thought that there ought to be an insertion to provide against any dis crimination against any railroad in the State, and inasmuch as the Carolina Central was nearly completed and this the dence on Chestnut street, between Third and mates of the cost of constructing the natural outlet of that road, he hoped that clause would be inserted.

WHEREAS, It is of the first importance, to the State at large, that the Western North Carolina Rai road should be completed at the earnest practicable moment;

Whereas I' seems to be improbable, if not impossible, that this can be done under the plans heretofere adopted, or which could be devi ed, under State con-

It behooves us, under the circumstances, as good citizens, not to throw obsta cles in the way of accomplishing the desired object in completing said road, which would result in good to the htate at large, though such sale might possibly not result in special benefits to some particular section thereof :

1. Be it Resolved, That our immediate Representatives and Senator, as well as the friends of our section in the Legislature, be requested to use every effort to secure the best terms possible in the proposed sale.

2. That, in our opinion, a sale in the manner proposed will be on much better terms than can possibly be obtained by a the guests to assemble around the festive sale at public outery.

3. That we consider it unwise to have allowed the construction of certain railroad lines, whose only reason for existence was an injurious rivalry with established lines of traffic, and the completion of which has proven damaging to capital already invested without affording compensating facilities to the people at large; and we do hereby urge upon the Legislature the importance of checking the construction of further parallel roads, tapping our main lines, diverting that trade which legitimately belongs to them, seriously impairing the State's interest in the North Carolina Railroad, and destroying a system which would build up the East as well as the West. And especially do we oppose the extension of the 'Midland Railroad' from Danville to Statesville, and favor the defeat of that project by any legitimate
