Mrs. Scott-Siddons.

The fact that Mrs. Scott-Siddons will appear at the Opera House in this city on the evening of April 9th, has already been announced through the columns of this paper. It will be a rare occasion for our people and we know that the opportunity for seeing and hearing Mrs. Siddons will be eagerly accepted by our people. There is no doubt of the reception which will be accorded her here. The New York *Telegram*, a good authority on any subject, has this to say of Mrs. Siddons:

In connection with Mrs. Scott-Siddons' appearance here this evening, it must be considered that this is her last tour of America, and the stage and reading desk must soon bid farewell to one of the most brilliantly beautiful and talented women by whom a public profession or private life was ever adorned. Few artists have endeared themselves to the American public as has Mary Scott-Siddons. Unlike many of her countrywomen, who came hither to display physical charms, and who were found to be utterly blank as to brains, Mrs. Siddons' beauty was found to be the exquisite casket enclosing rare gems of genius. Her pure face, immobile as marble in repose, was found to be a marvel of expressiveness in interpreting thought, and every motion of the lip form was full of suggestion in giving to a character dramatic life. Other beauties we have had by the dozen, women with faultless forms, fine faces and all the concomitants of feminine loveliness; but not one of them has approached Mrs. Siddons in intellectuality. Their beauty tainted too much of the physical and too little of the mental. They were of the earth, earthy—almost gross. They may have been supple in motion, graceful of gesture and possessed of voices full of melody, but they lacked soul, genius, fire—whatever quality that may be called, which, being added to beauty, surpasses it and makes the physical attractiveness the inferior and the aesthetic the superior. Mrs. Siddons was, and is, not only a beautiful woman, but a great actress, and one whose place on the stage it will be difficult to fill.—*New York Telegram*.
