We regret to learn of the sudden death of Dr. W. S. Everitt, a prother of Dr. S. 8. Everitt, of this city, who was found dead in his room in Charlotte yesterday

Dr. S. S. Everitt, was notified by telegraph yester lay morning of the death of his brother and left here last bight for Charlotte to convey the body to the family burying ground in Goldsbero .-He will probably be joined at Raleigh by his brother, Dr. D. E. Everitt. The Charlotte Daily Press gives this account of the death:

Dr. W. S. Everitt, surgeon dentist, a native of Goldsboro, for a long time residens of Concord, but for four months a resident of inis city, was found in his room of the Charlotte Hotel at an early hour this morning, sitting in a chair todressed, and dead. He had been suffering from a pain in the abdomen and was confined to his room all day on yesterday. A servant, who visited him at 8 A M reported that he was mouning considers bly, but upon being asked if he wanted anything, replied to the negative.

When discovered this morning, about 6:45 ocl'ock, Dr. O'Dorohue was called, and he found him sitting in the chair dead He tells us that he heard Dr. Everitt say last Saturday night that he was subject to attacks of angina pectoris, (heart disease) and it is his opinion that when he awoke during the night, he got up to get some water, and was taken with an attack which produced death. Dr. O'D. thinks ELEGANT LINE OF PIQUES he must have been dead about two hours. and that he died without a struggle, and which was made in Saturday's issue of he does not believe that he took any drug to deprive himself of life.

About 5 p.m. yesterday, Dr. McCombs attended him and administered medicine hyperdermically to relieve pain.
