Another Chapter in Amelia Linkhaw's Life.
Our readers all remember about the killing of Ed. Hartman, in Lumberton, some time ago, by Miss Amelia Linkhaw, of that town, for alleged seduction, and her recent trial and acquittal. There is another chapter in the same story, that of Miss Linkhaw's life, which is just given to the public and which we find in the columns of the Charlotte Observer. That paper says that during the period of Miss Linkhaw's confinement in the jail at Lumberton, when the only companion she had was her child, which was born after the enactment of the tragedy, she received many letters from sympathetic persons in all parts of the country. Among her correspondents was a man named Little, who is represented as a custom house officer stationed at Sullivan's Island, near Charleston. He became deeply interested in her and wrote to her repeatedly while she was in prison. On the night the trial was expected to close he was on the Island, and in attempting to reach Charleston during the prevalence of a severe storm, that he might hear at the earliest possible moment whether she was to live or die, he barely escaped being lost by the capsizing of the boat. After the acquittal of Miss Linkhaw, the correspondence was kept up, photographs were exchanged, and a proposal of marriage was made and accepted. A week ago, Miss Linkhaw, accompanied by her child and one of her sisters, left Lumberton and proceeded to Florence, S. C., where she was met by Mr. Little and the marriage ceremony was quietly performed. The three, mother, child and husband, then left for Mr. Little's home, and there the story, for the present, stops.

Sudden Death.

We regret to learn of the sudden death of Dr. W. S. Everitt, a brother of Dr. S. S. Everitt, of this city, who was found dead in his room in Charlotte yesterday morning.
Dr. S. S. Everitt, was notified by telegraph yesterday morning of the death of his brother and left here last night for Charlotte to convey the body to the family burying ground in Goldsboro. He will probably be joined at Raleigh by his brother, Dr. D. E. Everitt. The Charlotte Daily Press gives this account of the death:
When discovered this morning, about 6:45 o'clock, Dr. O'Donohue was called, and he found him sitting in the chair dead. He tells us that he heard Dr. Everitt say last Saturday night that he was subject to attacks of *angina pectoris* (heart disease) and it is his opinion that when he awoke during the night, he got up to get some water, and was taken with an attack which produced death. Dr. O'D. thinks he must have been dead about two hours, and that he died without a struggle, and he does not believe that he took any drug to deprive himself of life.
About 5 p. m. yesterday, Dr. McCombs attended him and administered medicine hyperdermically to relieve pain.
The Coroner, at noon, empanelled a jury and Dr. Wilder, the county physician, is making a *post mortem* examination and the jury will probably render a verdict of death from heart disease.
Dr. Everitt was of a kind and genial nature, very sociable and much liked in this community. He was about 38 years of age. He has a brother, also a Jesuit, in Raleigh. He has been telegraphed the sad tidings and will probably come and convey the remains to Goldsboro, for burial.
