Serious Accident.
One of those serious accidents which occasionally befall those in the employ of railroad corporations, happened at about 1 o'clock this afternoon to William Allen, a colored man, a car groomer, in the employ of the W. C. & A. Railroad. It seems that a heavy car belonging to the North Eastern road was attached to the train, which had a platform at each end, but there were no steps to the car, as are used in other cars of like character. Allen came out of the car, and it is supposed, that being unaware of the absence of the steps or forgetting the fact, stepped down as usual and of course fell to the ground. The car at the time was being moved slowly, and Allen was caught between the stationary platform, which extends from the East side of Nutt street towards Front street bridge. In this position his body was kept revolving around until the train could be stopped which was about three-fourths the length of the car. He was taken from his terrible position astenderly and quickly as possible, but both arms were broken and very serious internal injuries were inflicted about the lower portion of the body, the extent and nature of which had not been ascertained when we left. Dr. George G. Thomas was promptly at hand, and the wounded man was placed first upon a stretcher, and then upon a platform car, and taken up towards Seventh street, near which he resides, attended by the physician and Captain James Knight, with assistants to convey him from the car to his residence. It is greatly feared that the internal injuries to the wounded man are of so serious a nature as to result fatally.

From a friend who has just returned from the session, we understand that a meeting of the Wilmington Presbytery was held at Brown Marsh, or Clarkton, on the C. O. Railway, commencing on Thursday last at 12 o'clock. Quite a goodly number of Presbyterians were present, we learn, and there was preaching every day in the Brown Marsh Church, morning, afternoon and night. Rev. George McMillan was elected Moderator and presided. Rev. James Sprunt, D. D., the stated secretary, was present and participated in the proceedings in his official capacity. The regular routine of business was disposed of and the meeting adjourned on Saturday afternoon. But many lingered over Sunday and enjoyed the hospitalities of the good people in that section of Bladen, still another day, when the last of the delegates came down on the Carolina Central this morning.

Legislative Locals.
In the House, on Friday, Mr. Richardson introduced a bill to incorporate the Historical and Scientific Society of Wilmington and on Saturday this bill passed the Senate.

Mr. Armstrong introduced a bill to authorize the Commissioners of New Hanover county to levy a special tax.

Mr. Scott, a bill to amend chapters 92 and 116, laws of 1879.

Senate bill 102, to allow the tax collector of Robeson county until July to settle for his taxes, passed its final reading.

Bill to amend section 48, schedule B, revenue act, was taken up. It reduces the liquor license tax of \$6 per month to \$3, and the 5 per cent tax on purchases to 2 1/2 per cent. The bill passed its several readings.

In the Senate, on Saturday, the bill to incorporate the Market Company of the city of Wilmington passed its second and third readings.

In the House a bill to incorporate a turnpike road from Hewlett's to Whisky Creek, New Hanover county, passed its readings.

House bill 150, to amend chapter 260, laws of 1879, providing for the giving of twenty-five convicts to aid in building a road in Jones and Onslow counties, passed its final reading.

Bill to appropriate \$10,000 for the construction of the Duplin Canal came up, and provoked considerable discussion. Mr. Blocker offered an amendment making the appropriation \$5,000. Last An amendment was then offered, providing that in lieu of the appropriation the State should grant one half the lands through which the canal runs. This amendment was adopted and the bill passed its second reading. It was then referred to a special committee.

Committee to consider the Duplin Canal Company bill reported the same, with a substitute providing for the conveyance of the alternate sections of land by the State. The bill then passed its final reading.

It is said that \$75,000 will probably be the amount of the appropriation by this Congress for the Cape Fear river and bar improvements, and the Engineers say that they can make this amount available at once in good, hard work.
