Col. Gordon and the Hamburg-Bremen.

We notice in the *Richmond Commonwealth* a very handsome reference to Col. Jno. W. Gordon, the senior member of the firm of Gordon & Pleasants, of Richmond, general agents in Virginia for the Hamburg-Bremen, a company, by the way, which is well known to the people of this city and section inasmuch as it has been represented here by Messrs. Gordon & Bro. for the past six years.
Early last summer the company began to consider the question of entering the State of Virginia and invited Col. Gordon to inquire into and report on the prospect of a profitable business from that State, which resulted in a decision on the part of the American managers to enter their company in this new field. Of course Col. Gordon had many strong competitors among the resident insurance men of Virginia for the State Agency. He was, however, appointed General Agent and as the *Commonwealth* says, on January 1st formed a partnership with Messrs. H. A. & Wm. H. Pleasants, who were local agents for La Caisse Insurance Company of Paris. Since his appointment Col. Gordon has been all over the State and has located agencies at all prominent points, which, on the whole, have thus far done a satisfactory business.

Postal Cards.

The postal card is a little over six years old in this country, yet it is doing as well as could be expected for its age. It has only two enemies, the man who receives duties on it, and the manufacturer of writing paper. The little postal causes a decrease of from twelve to fifteen million dollars every year in the business of the writing paper trade in this country. Postal cards are made at the rate of four to the sheet, and are constantly employed at their manufacture. The cardboard is furnished in packages of 3,000 each, and every sheet is made into forty postal cards. Three presses are kept going night and day. A machine slices the sheets into strips of ten cards each, and these in turn are cut into single cards and dumped in piles of twenty-five cards each, when they are packed by means of a special box containing 500 cards. A government officer is constantly on hand to see that no pilfering of cards is done. The Holyoke manufacturing turns out about a million of cards a day. Last year there were used in this country 120 hundred and forty-six million sixty-three thousand and sixty cards. Of the new international card introduced a few weeks since, there have been two millions used already. The government keeps on hand twenty-five million of the postal cards.
