The following is the report of Mr. C. H. Robinson, President of the Produce Exchange, which was submitted at the regular annual meeting of that body yesterday. We endeavored to obtain it then for publication but could not get it in time:  
Gentlemen of the Wilmington Produce Exchange:  
I shall present as briefly as possible the statistics of the past year, with such remarks as may suggest themselves for your consideration.
