## Two Cent Postal Card.

It seems after all that we are to have the double postal card. The bill providing for a two cent card has been favorably reported by the House committee on postoffices. It is to have a flexible flap or cover adapted to conceal the writing. The committee say in their report that this card will be an intermediate means of correspondence between the letter sheet and the open postal card, and would be availed of by thousands who will not use the open postal card on account of publicity. The proposed card would not hold any more than the one cent card, and its adoption could not, therefore, affect letter correspondence.

## Military News.

The report of the Adjutant General for the year 1879, says the Raleigh *Observer*, will be out next week. The report puts the strength of the First Regiment at 611; the Second Regiment at 497; the Third Regiment at 470; the Second Battalion at 254; the Fourth Battalion at 401; and the Fifth Battalion at 388. The total strength of the First Brigade was 1,417, and of the Second Brigade 1,133. The grand total of the State Guard of all grades and all arms was, on the 31st of December, 1879, 2,587.

Since the publication of this report, one company of the Second Regiment and four companies of the Fifth Battalion have been disbanded. The latter organization has now but one company left.

## Questions to be Answered.

The time is drawing near when the census taker will enter upon his duties, and in order to expedite business it would be well for all persons to prepare themselves to answer all questions promptly. The following statement in regard to agriculture will be found of interest: The census taker will want to know from each farmer the number of acres of land planted and the amount raised in 1879, of wheat, corn, rye, oats, barley, buckwheat, peas and beans, rice, tobacco, cotton, potatoes, orchards, vineyards, small fruit, hay, clover seed, grass seed, hops, hemp, flax seed, bees and honey, sugar cane and sorghum. The number of sheep clipped and pounds of wool in 1880. Yield of the twelve months from June, 1879, to June 1880, of butter, cheese and milk sold; value of animals slaughtered; market gardens; forest products and value of home manufactures. Our farmers know how valuable their time is during the month of June and it will be well for them to think this matter over before they are called upon by the enumerator.

## Chief Marshal.

## Fruit or No Fruit.

Speculations, in the different news papers throughout the State, relative to the prospects of a good fruit crop this season are fearfully at variance. They are about equally divided, one-half claiming that we shall have an abundant crop, while the other half positively declares that the fruit is 'kilt entirely,' and that 'nary' a peach, apple or plum will we have with which to regale our editorial appetite during the year.

## The Infanticide Case.

We have been unable to obtain the official report of the findings of the jury of inquest held over the body of the infant, in the case of supposed infanticide mentioned by us yesterday, but we learn that it is substantially, that the child came to its death through the willful and intentional neglect of its mother, Susan Waddell. The unnatural mother has been committed to jail, without the benefit of bail, to await the action of the grand jury in the matter.

## The Alarm This Forenoon.

The alarm of fire this forenoon was caused by the ignition of the roof of an old house just in the rear of the Fibre Works, and owned by Mr. Francis Morris, of New York. It caught from a spark from the chimney. As soon as the alarm was given the works at Messrs. Kidder & Sons' mills were stopped and about fifty hands, armed with buckets full of water, soon drenched the roof and put out the fire. The services of the fire department were not needed. The damage to the building was very slight.

## The Greenville and Columbia Railroad.

We spoke yesterday of the bidding in Columbia at the sale of the Greenville & Columbia R. R., but could not give the final result, which we did not learn until after our paper was in press. It was sold to Mr. W. A. Courtenay, of Charleston, for \$2,968,400, and this was in accordance with our premises, that the people of that city could not afford to allow this road to pass into the hands of parties in other States. It is said here, however, that Mr. Courtenay purchased for Mr. W. P. Clyde, of New York, although this may be based upon the mere fact that Mr. Courtenay is an agent in Charleston for the Clyde line of steamers. At all events the road will hereafter, undoubtedly, be controlled in the interest of Charleston.

## Fire this Morning.

This morning, at 4 o'clock, the alarm of fire was sounded, caused by the burning of a two-story frame building on Market, between Twelfth and Thirteenth streets, owned and occupied by Mr. Harriet Hintz. The building was soon consumed as was also the one adjoining owned by Messrs. Adrian & Vollers, and occupied by Dr. Thos. B. Carr. The fire was undoubtedly incendiary as it was first discovered in three places under Mr. Hintz's hitchen. Mr. Hintz was insured for \$1,500 on house and furniture and his loss will amount to \$1,000 above it besides a loss of \$115 in cash, which was consumed. Dr. Carr's furniture was insured and his loss was covered by insurance and salvage. Messrs. Adrian & Vollers had \$1,500 on their property and their loss will exceed that amount by about \$800.
