## Memorial Day—The Reasons for the Change in the Day.

But one more day besides this intervenes between now and Memorial Day, in which any preparation can be made for that event. We earnestly trust that all of the societies as well as the military organizations that are in the habit of participating in the ceremonies of this solemn occasion will signify their intention to participate, to the Chief Marshal at the meeting to be held in the Library Room at 8 o'clock to-night.

In this connection it might be well to state again that the reason for the change of the day in observing these memorial services, was simply on account of the season. The 10th of May being so late and the weather at that season generally so warm in this climate, that it was very trying to the Ladies of the Memorial Association as well as to the younger ladies, the misses and little girls of the Children's Memorial Association, to march through the burning sun and sand as they are accustomed to do, all the way to Oakdale Cemetery. In addition to this, there have been one or two serious attacks, and in one particular instance with fatal results, we regret to say, among the soldier boys, who had become overburdened from the excessive heat and the very heavy thick uniform worn by them during the long march to the Cemetery. Another reason—which we think, however, less potent than those already named—is the fact that the flowers here have nearly all disappeared by the 10th of May. This last reason is the one given in Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi and Louisiana for celebrating the Memorial services in those States at an earlier period than May. In Georgia, Alabama and Mississippi the 26th day of April, the same day that we are to celebrate here, is the day that has always been observed in those States; in Louisiana the 6th day of April, the anniversary of the battle of Shiloh, in which General Albert Sidney Johnson was slain, is the day kept.

The Ladies' Memorial Association of this city, we are told, selected the 26th day of April on account of its being the anniversary of the surrender of General Jos. E. Johnston at Greensboro, when the last flickering hope for the weak and feeble Confederacy expired forever, so far as we were concerned. Therefore, it is, that they think the day an appropriate one on which to have memorial services for the gallant dead of the departed Southern Confederacy.

## A Lick for a Blow.

Josephine Turner was arrested this morning charged with an assault upon Sarah Jones, the little girl whose mother, Love Ann Jones, was arrested some time ago as an accomplice in a hellish design upon her own daughter and who is now in jail, having been convicted of the crime. The woman Turner, it seems has been caring for the child since the imprisonment of her mother, and having caught her in some indecent behavior chastised her for it. Turner was then arrested and carried before Justice Mills. She submitted the case and was released upon the payment of the costs.

## A Good Law.

As there are some of our readers hereabouts who think they could not begin to get even-handed justice before certain Magistrates in this county, who are Trial Justices, we commend the following extract from a law notified in the General Assembly on the 26th of March last, for their perusal. We are indebted to *Hale's Weekly* for the summary:

The act took effect at once and provides that in all proceedings and trials, both criminal and civil, before justices of the peace, the justice before whom the writ or summons is returnable, shall upon affidavit made by either party to the action that he is unable to obtain justice before him, move the same to some other justice residing in the same township, or to the justice of some neighboring township if there be no other justice in said township. Provided, that no cause shall be more than once removed.

## Off for Europe.

Mr. R. E. Heide, Vice Consul for Norway, Sweden and Denmark at this port, accompanied by his two eldest daughters, left this city this morning on the steamship *Benefactor* for New York en route for Europe. During their absence they will visit England, France, Germany, Norway, Sweden and Denmark. A large number of their friends were at the steamer's wharf this morning to bid them adieu and *bon voyage*. The steamer pushed out into the stream amid the waving of handkerchiefs and salutes of the steam tugs and steamboats in the port. The *Benefactor* was accompanied down the river by the steam tug *Wm. Nyce*, on which there were a party of Mr. and the Misses Heide's friends. To the happy trio we extend our best wishes, and hope that their voyage may be pleasant.

The North Carolina Medical Journal, for April has been received. ## The Elysium of Wilmington.

We wish to offer no excuses for invading the premises at the rear of the residence of Mr. J. Loeb, French Vice Consul at this port. In Mr. Loeb's landscape garden is a most beautiful artificial fish pond. It is 40 feet long by 18 feet wide, and is supplied by three large springs and about twelve small boiling springs. The borders of the pond are fringed with water cresses and flags, such as sheltered the infant Moses. On the borders of the pond grow the celestial and calla lily. At the southern end of it are rocks out of the crevices of which grow ferns, mosses, etc. On the margin of the pond is a summer house with a sufficient look of antiquity about it to make it look interesting. It is covered with the fragrant honeysuckle, the perfume of which pervades the whole atmosphere.

Among the branches of the honeysuckle are hung cages containing canary, mocking and red birds, whose cheery whistle adds to the serenity of the spot. The pond, which is said to contain about ten thousand fish, is in the centre of one of the prettiest gardens in this city, and the place may justly be termed the Elysium

of Wilmington. The idea of making the pond was conceived by Mr. Loeb and Mr. Victor Hurleaux, a friend of his boyhood. In addition to the natural advantages afforded by the spot, artistic skill and the French taste, have been added. We wish there were more such spots in this community, and truly there would be more oases in the desert of city life.

We are glad to know that our young friend Mr. Joseph H. Watters, who was so seriously injured by the falling walls at the fire on Front street one week ago last Sunday, is again able to be out, having made his first appearance down town yesterday morning. 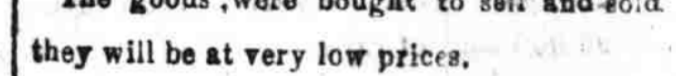
