Assistance Needed.

A meeting of the marshals for Memorial Day was held at the rooms of the Library Association, yesterday afternoon, to perfect arrangements for the celebration on Monday next. It being ascertained that the Ladies' Memorial Association was greatly in need of funds to carry out the purposes of the Association, the following preamble and resolution, were presented and adopted:

WHEREAS, We have learned that there are graves of our departed comrades in our cemetery whose relatives are either absent or not pecuniarily able to bestow on them that care and attention which they so richly deserve; and, whereas, we have learned that the funds in the hands of the Ladies' Memorial Association are insufficient for this duty, as well as for defraying the necessary expenses attending the annual exercises; and, whereas, the ladies have heretofore not given the gentlemen an opportunity of expressing their interest by contributing to these expenses; therefore, be it

Resolved, That it is the opinion of those present that it is the sentiment of all ex-Confederates that the graves of our comrades should not be allowed to show any signs of neglect, and that the ladies should be encouraged by our pecuniary aid, as well as sympathetic sentiments, to perpetuate these ceremonies in a becoming manner, and that a committee of five be appointed to open subscription lists for this purpose, and tender the money to the Ladies' Memorial Association.

In accordance with the above resolution the following gentlemen were appointed as a Committee to solicit contributions for the purpose mentioned: Messrs. J. G. Wright, H. O. Prempert, E. H. King, T. D. Meares, and J. C. Stevenson.

The Greenbackers, i. e. the County Executive Committee of this organization, met pursuant to adjournment in the Court House again to-day at 12 o'clock, 'Squire T. M. Gardner in the Chair and A. A. Dudley acting as Secretary. The ostensible purpose of the meeting was for the appointment of delegates to the Greenback Convention and a Committee from the Committee had retired to the Committee room, to consider and recommend proper persons as delegates when "Col." Tecumseh Cut-lar obtained the floor upon a question of personal privilege—being recognized by the temporary Chairman, Mr. Curtis, for that purpose. The "Col." then proceeded to "orate" to a very considerable extent. He vowed and declared or, rather—parties who heard him told us that he swore and he d—d that "the meeting consisted of nothing but a parcel of d—d ignorant niggers who did not know what they come yer fur." The Chairman tried to silence "Col" Cut-lar but the bug juice in the "Col" was working lively about that time and the Col. just told them up and down that he would not sit down nor be sat down on either, and then in a Patrick Henry sort of style, he exclaimed, if this be treason make the most of it, and they do say that some of the Col's expressions were neither chaste nor select. The Greenbackers are consequently in high dudgeon at the interference of Cut-lar when they claim is not a Greenbacker, and they declare their intention of having him indicted for disturbing their meeting.

The Democratic Convention in Session To-Day—Maj Stedman Endorsed.

BURGAW, April 24—5 P. M.

The Pender County Democratic Convention was held to-day in the Academy in this town.

The Convention was called to order with Mr Thos. Williams in the chair and Drs. G. F. Lucas and W. C. Murphy as Secretaries.

Resolutions were passed endorsing Major Stedman, but no further instructions were given.

The county sends twenty seven delegates to the Congressional Convention and forty-five to the State Convention.
