## The Tenth of May.

To-day, the 10th of May, is the anniversary of the day on which the spirit of the immortal Stonewall Jackson winged its flight and "crossed over the river to rest under the shade of the trees." It is an oft told story, but the firing of the fatal shot that brought low the brilliant warrior and the ablest Lieutenant to the commander of the army of Northern Virginia is thought to have been discharged by the 18th N. C. Regiment under command of the lamented Col. Purdie. The eighteenth was stationed on picket at the time of the disaster; and they simply did their duty and carried out orders, General Jackson's own orders, in firing the fatal volley which deprived the Army of Northern Virginia of its right arm. We have heard it said, and in fact, the writer of this was told by an officer of the Eighteenth Regiment shortly after the sad occurrence related above, that Col. Purdie's anguish at the terrible result of his regiment's firing, weighed so heavily on his mind that he seemed to forget all else, and was not only melancholy, but reckless during the remainder of the light and the battle of the next day. Col. Purdie was at all times a gallant and fearless soldier, but we are told that on the morning after the wounding of Jackson, at the battle of Chancellorsville proper, this brave spirit exhibited a courage equal to rashness, and that it was while he was moving around on the field ordering his men to lie down, while he himself was in a most exposed position, that the fatal bullet came which pierced his brain, and caused North Carolina to mourn another departed hero among the many thousands she had already given to the cause.

Ex-President Davis while in the hands of the vandals and in confinement at Fortress Monroe, gave utterance, during a conversation with the Post Surgeon, who paid him occasional visits, to a beautiful sentiment in regard to the death of Jackson. The conversation, it turned upon the Federal doctor's account, seemed upon the death of Jackson, and he asked Mr. Davis what he thought of the occurrence, when the old man eloquent quoted from Byron's English Bards and Scotch Reviewers the following lines:

"'Twas thine own genius gave the final blow; And help'd to plant the wound that laid thee low."

So struck the eagle, stretched upon the plain, No more through rolling clouds to soar again, Viewed his own feather on the fatal dart, And winged the shaft that quivered in his heart.

By his own order the fatal volley was fired that caused the death of the illustrious patriot and great military chieftain—Stonewall Jackson.

## City Court.

The Mayor's levee was well attended this morning. The first case called was that of Robert J. Inson, colored, charged with willful trespass. The defendant is a porter for a hotel in this city, and was ordered to keep off of the Railroad Company's property, on account of misbehavior. He paid no heed to the warning and the Mayor told him \$5—or seven days.

Wm. Phinney, who is well known in police circles, was next called. He had threatened his mother's life, and after cursing, abusing and notifying her that he had a balter purposely for her neck, went off to put his threats into operation, when he was arrested. The Mayor told him 50 days in the city prison for disorderly conduct and using profane language on the street; and a justified bond of \$100 to keep the peace for six months.

Carl Babbitt and James Watson, two sons of the Emerald Isle, were arraigned for an affray. They were ordered to pay a fine of \$2.50 each or go below, i. e. in the station house, for three days.

The Examining Board is composed of Doctors P E Hines of Raleigh, Geo L Kirby, of Goldsboro, Joseph Graham, of Charlotte, R I Hicks, of Granville, Thos F Wood, of Wilmington, H T Bahnsen, of Salem and T D Haigh, of Fayetteville. These gentlemen have also arrived and entered upon the discharge of their duties this morning at the office of Dr Thos F Wood.

About 100 delegates are expected on the different trains and steamboats to-night and to-morrow.

The following named gentlemen were before the board to-day: Doctors V S McNider, L M Powers, K J Powers, A Hassell, Rich Dillard, Jr., John T Schenwall, W C Galloway, J M Stansill, R H Adams, L W Hunter and S J Montague. From fifteen to twenty more are expected to-morrow. At 11 o'clock to-morrow the delegates will assemble at the Opera House when the Convention will be called to order by the President, Dr J F Shaffner and opened with a prayer by the Rev C M Payne, M D. Dr W J H Bellamy will then deliver the address of welcome. The regular annual address will be delivered at the Opera House on Wednesday evening by Dr Eugene Grisom, of Raleigh.
