Twenty-Seventh Annual Session of the North Carolina Medical Society.

(Continued from Yesterday's Report.)
Dr. Wood, as Chairman of the Committee appointed to examine the metric system, made his report and moved that the system should not be adopted, which was carried.

Dr. Payne, Chairman of the Finance Committee, reported that the books of the Treasurer had been examined, found correct, and well kept; that there was a balance in the Treasury at last session of \$229 85; received since then, \$491.66; amount expended \$420.00; leaving a balance now on hand of \$300.75. That the Treasurer has a list prepared of the delinquent members whose names will be read, and if dues are not paid their names will be dropped from the roll and they will be virtually expelled. The committee further recommended an annual assessment of \$2.00 per capita.

On motion of Dr. Faison the report was received and adopted.

Dr. Payne moved that the Secretary be allowed \$100 for services. Carried.

The Secretary read the resignation of Dr. R. K. Gregory, of Greensboro, and it was on motion accepted.

A letter of regret at not being able to attend the Convention, from Dr. P. E. Hines, of Raleigh, was read.

Dr. Satchwell introduced the following: Whereas, it was the original intent, and is the spirit and meaning of the act incorporating this Society and establishing the State Board of Medical Examiners, that eligibility to membership should consist in holding a certificate of qualifications from said Board; therefore,

Resolved, That in lieu of section 2d article 32d, of the constitution, defining the eligibility to membership, the following shall be and is hereby substituted: Sec 2d. The permanent members of the Society shall consist of such regular physicians as shall have complied with the law of the State embraced in an act to incorporate the Medical Society of the State of North Carolina, and for the establishment of a Medical Board of Examiners, and

Unanimously adopted.
The Secretary read a communication from the Edgecombe County Medical Society, the substance of which is to punish, by a fine of \$50, or imprisonment for not less than ninety days, any one found guilty of the misdemeanor of practicing medicine or surgery in this State contrary to the statute which incorporated the State Medical Society and established the State Board of Medical Examiners. That statute makes it a misdemeanor for any one to practice medicine and surgery in North Carolina who has not a license from such Board; unless such person was engaged in practice prior to the passage of the law in question. The Edgecombe Society also asks for the passage of a law creating a board to examine druggists in this State, and also for a law requiring that in all cases of death, before burial, the certificate of a physician shall be furnished, and when no physician attended, that the certificate of a Justice of the Peace shall be furnished.

The whole subject was referred to a special committee of five, to report at this session. The following are the committee: Drs. S. Satchwell, John McDonald, W. T. Ennett, Thos. J. Moore and H. M. Alford.

Dr. Summerell, chairman of the Committee on Credentials, reported the following gentlemen as duly accredited delegates to the Convention: Edgecombe County Medical Society—Drs. N. J. Pittman and J. H. Baker; Rowan County Medical Society—Drs. Hill and McLellan; New Hanover Medical Association—Drs. W. G. Thomas, H. S. Norcom and Edward King.

Dr. Carr read a paper on epithelioma.

Dr. Satchwell moved that Dr. Carr's paper, and all others that might be subsequently read, be referred to Committee on Publication.

Several cases of different kinds were reported and discussed during the remainder of the afternoon.

On motion of Dr. Carr, the Society adjourned to meet this morning at 9 o'clock

SECOND DAY.

MORNING SESSION.
The Convention was called to order by the President, Dr. Shafer, at 9 o'clock. The chair announced the following committee on nominations: Doctors N. J. Pittman, J. J. Summerell, Eugene Grissom, H. T. Bishson.

Dr. J. J. Summerell, on the part of the Committee on Credentials, made a partial report, and introduced the following named gentlemen as eligible to become members of this Society: Doctors R. A.

Harsser, Tobacoville; L. W. Powers, Plymouth; C. M. Pool, Salisbury.
Drs. J. H. McRae, W. C. McDuffie, J. W. McNeill, delegates from the Cumberland County Medical Society, coming accredited, were admitted to seats in the Convention.

Dr. N. J. Pittman reported a case 'aim-bum', exhibiting specimen.

Dr. Foote moved that the annual essay now be read.

Dr. T. J. Moore, of Charlotte, Essayist for the occasion, read a very exhaustive and interesting paper on Pelvis Cellulitis.

Dr. McDonald, of Washington, moved to return a vote of thanks to Dr. Moore and that the essay be referred to Committee on Publication. Carried.

Dr. McDonald spoke of the evil effect of the use of sewing machines.

Dr. Summerell, Chairman of the Committee on Credentials, recommended the name of Dr. H. P. Ivey for membership in the Society.

On motion, Dr. H. P. Ivey was admitted to membership.

Letters of regret from Doctors Lyon Allison and Hadley were read.

Dr. Lilly, of Concord, presented specimens of 'calculus from the bladder of a hog with string as nucleus.' Also a biliary calculus from a lady with distinct stercoraceous odor to vomit, no icterus which was treated with warm enemata, hot applications and hypodermics of morphia.

Dr. Foote showed specimens of urinary calculus and stone, from bladder of a woman. Dr. Foote also spoke of a case where common cooking soda was used for burns with good results.

Dr. Summerell spoke of a stone weighing 1 1/2 ounces which was taken from the bladder of a woman by simple dilation.

Dr. Carr, of Durham, spoke of a case of anasarca.

Dr. Tate Murphy spoke of a case of burn with the soda treatment, but found that the soda would crystallize and cut in the flesh.

Dr. Tate Murphy spoke of a case of large ulcer of the leg which required the amputation of the limb. The length of time of the ulcer and the quickness of recovery being the principal features of the case.

Dr. Holmes spoke of the good effects of carbolic acid in dressing the above reported wound.

Dr. McDonald also spoke of a case of amputation and dressing the wound with carbolic acid.

Dr. Gaither spoke of carbolic acid as the best remedy for burns he had ever tried.

Dr. Summerell spoke of the great advantages of spirits turpentine and alcohol in dressing wounds where other remedies were not to be had.

Dr. Bellamy asked if Martin's bandage had been tried in the case of the amputation of the chronic ulcerated leg.

Dr. Bellamy said that his reason for asking the question was that he had seen very difficult amputations performed almost without the loss of blood by the use of the bandage.

Dr. McDonald spoke of a very difficult operation with the aid of the Martin bandage.

Dr. Potter spoke of successful use of Graft's adhesive straps.

Dr. Hill said he was much interested in the specimens of gall stones. Says chloroform taken internally was a specific for all cases that had come under his observation.

Dr. Lane moved to adjourn until 3 o'clock this afternoon.

Dr. G. G. Thomas notified the Convention that tickets for the excursion down the river on Friday, given complimentary to the Medical Convention, would be on the Secretary's desk this afternoon.

The motion to adjourn was then put and carried.
