

A True Snake Story.

an old soldier in going back in memory
through the long vista of years that have
been rolled back by the tide of
time, to recall some thrilling
event, wherein one was allowed
to be the happy possessor of his own soul
yet a little while longer, by the mere
breadth of a hair—or, to use a more ex-
pressive expression—the skin of his
teeth, as it were, but still, it is even so.
There is much pleasure too to be gathered
around a festive board where all
who meet once were the tattered
stragglers and stood shoulder
to shoulder in a common cause
risking their lives in defence of their
country's honor. There, at least, the men
who stood together in the dark days of
war when the clouds hung heavy and
lowering over our fair Southland, can ap-
preciate each other, for they have been
tried by the same fire and they know how
far each comrade will go in the hour of
danger and in the path of duty.
