For the Review. Democratic Convention - Sampson County.

CLINTON, N. C., May 15, 1880. Pursuant to the call of M. C. Richardson, Esq., Chairman of the Democratic County Executive Committee, the Democrats of Sampson met in the Court House in Clinton. The Convention was called to order by Mr. Richardson, who explained the object of the meeting to be, First, The election of a County Executive Committee.

Second, The election of delegates to the Congressional and State Democratic Conventions. On motion of Mr. E. T. Boykin the Convention was permanently organized by calling M. C. Richardson to the chair. J. W. S. Robinson and R. R. Bell were requested to act as Secretaries.

On motion of H. E. Royal, a committee of one from each township was appointed to draft resolutions. The following delegates composed the Committee, to wit: E. T. Boykin, Chas. Smith, Jas. S. Hines, B. Hill, W. A. Jackson, Chas. Williams, F. M. White, L. J. Rich, Oliver Blackburn, J. A. Moore, Wm. Fryar and G. W. Hobbs.

During the absence of the committee Mr. Chas. Hines, upon invitation, entertained the Convention in a brief and pertinent speech. The Committee on Resolutions, through their Chairman, Mr. E. T. Boykin, reported the following which were unanimously adopted: The Democratic voters of Sampson County, assembled in Convention in Clinton, May 15, 1880.

Resolved 1st. That they hereby renew their pledge of allegiance to the party and promise an earnest and united support of its nominees in the coming campaign and election. Resolved 2nd. That the importance of the Congressional election demands a more than ordinary precaution in the selection of a candidate.

The Democrats of Sampson, recognizing and appreciating the fact that the name of their distinguished fellow-citizen will be offered before the Congressional Convention by the enthusiastic popular voice of the entire district; referring, with pride, to the high character he has sustained in private life, and his brilliant record, and spotless reputation in his Legislative and judicial careers; believing that he can harmonize the discordant elements in the Democratic party in the District; realizing that by unity of action and wisdom of counsel the District can be redeemed from the ruinous results of the Democratic defeat in 1878, and assured that by the nomination of their esteemed and universally popular county-man, the glorious fruits of a Democratic victory will be secured, do earnestly recommend to the voters of the Third Congressional District, a careful consideration of the qualifications, (necessarily in a candidate for Congress) so eminently possessed by that good man, popular citizen, upright judge, and Christian gentleman, the Hon. Alimand A. McKoy, of Sampson.

Resolved 3rd. That the delegates from Sampson to the Congressional Convention are hereby instructed by the united Democracy of the county to vote as a unit for the Hon. A. McKoy, and to use all honorable means in their power to secure his nomination. Resolved 4th. That all Democrats in good party standing in the county are invited to attend the Congressional Convention, at Fayetteville, on June 2nd, and all such are hereby declared to be entitled to the full privileges of regularly appointed delegates.
