

The Fuman Figure.

The proportions of the human figure are six times the length of the feet. Whether the form is slender or plump, the rule holds good. Any deviation from it is a departure from the highest beauty statues according to this rule. The face, from the bighest point of the forehead where the hair begins, to the chin, is onetenth of the whole stature. The band, from the wrist to the middle-finger, is the same. From the top of the chest to the highest point of the forehead is a seventh. If the face, from the roots of the hair to the chin, be divided into three equal parts, the first division determines the places where the eyebrows meet, and the second the place of the nostrils. The height from the feet to the top of the head the distance from the extremity of the fingers when the arms are extended.
