The Convention meets at St. Paul's Church, in Winston, on Wednesday next. Bishop Lyman will preside, Bishop Atkinson being unable to attend. The names of those of the lay delegates who will be in attendance from Wilmington have not yet transpired.

Drowned.

Two colored men were drowned off the schooner *Charles Thomas*, while lying at anchor at Moore's Inlet, Wrightsville Sound, on Saturday night last. The schooner was lumber laden, and was waiting for favorable tide to the landing. One of the men lost his hat overboard and his companion, who is thought to be his brother, went with him in a small boat to get it, and they have not since been seen. We have been unable to ascertain the names of the unfortunate men. They hailed from Smithville.

Criminal Court.

This tribunal, His Honor Judge Meares presiding, convened in special session this morning at 11 o'clock. The following named persons were drawn as Grand Jurors to serve during the term, to wit: Chas W Bradley, Foreman; Henry Price, George Frigge, E J Littleton, Wilkes Morris, J W Penny, Nathaniel Simmons, C P Mebane, John S Corbett, John M Bremer, Jas H Carraway, Edward Nixon, Peter Bloom, Lewis Todd, Hosea Sheppard, Samuel Davis, L L Egan, W D Mabun.

The jury men took their seats in the box, when His Honor delivered his charge, after which they took a recess until half past 2 o'clock. The afternoon session of the court was principally occupied up to the time of closing our report in calling witnesses and other routine matter.

Twenty Tons of Fish.

It would seem that Northern fishermen have found out that there is not only good but profitable sport at the fishing grounds off the mouth of the Cape Fear. One day last week a fishing smack of some 30 or 40 tons burthen left for New York with between 15 and 20 tons of blackfish and snappers, caught at the Snapper Ground, about five miles distant from the Lightship. They had been at it, off and on, for about two weeks, and would occasionally run into Sautsville. The fish are easily kept alive in the smack's well. There were seven men in all on board and they all fished. They expect to sell the cargo in New York and it is said they will probably realize 15 cents a pound for their fish. If they do (and we don't believe they will) their cargo, counting 2,000 pounds to the ton, will be worth about \$6,000.

City Court.

His Honor, Mayor Fishblate, presiding. King McCall, colored, charged with an affray, was the first case called. The defendant was discharged and case dismissed.

J. H. Sampson, colored, charged with disorderly conduct was fined \$5, which was afterwards remitted and the defendant released upon the payment of costs. George Washington, alias George Schofield, alias George Wilson, a colored lad of twelve or fourteen years of age, who was charged with forcible trespass in that he continued to sleep on private premises, after being warned not to do so, was sent to jail in default of costs.
