## Railroad Improvements.

Since the recent purchase by the railroad company of the property on the South side of Hanover street, between Second and Third streets, a force of hands have been employed in grading the ground on the lot bordering on the latter street and laying the foundation for the building which it is contemplated to erect thereon. The foundation walls are of granite blocks which are quarried on the line of the Raleigh and Gaston railroad and are brought from thence by rail. The work is of the most substantial kind and is evidently "put there to stay." The company is greatly in need of more yard room than it now has at control, and the newly acquired property will furnish facilities it has not heretofore possessed.

With the enlargement of the facilities for the workshops, and better conveniences for passenger traffic accommodation, and the extensive increase of freight accommodation which will be accomplished when the improvements on the river front, now in progress, are completed, the road will have ample room for all its probable requirements, instead of being cramped and circumscribed as it now is.

The company is also making ready, in addition to all the other improvements in progress, to build the iron bridge across the tracks at the Front street depot. To accomplish that purpose the old wooden bridge is being torn up at its southern terminus in order to put in a substantial granite abutment for the new bridge.

## News from Cumberland.

The news from Cumberland county, which held its primary election yesterday for delegates to the Congressional and State Conventions, is considerably mixed. A note was handed into this office to day giving us the purport of a telegram from Fayetteville by one of Major Stedman's adherents, who claims that the author of his information in Fayetteville is perfectly reliable. The note is as follows:

Received telegram from Fayetteville that the majority of delegates elected from the town are for Stedman, and that in the upper portion of the county the delegates elected are for Mr. Neill Ray, an attorney who resides in Fayetteville.

Per contra, a friend of Judge McKoy handed us a telegram from Fayetteville of which the following is an exact copy with the address and signature omitted:

FAYETTEVILLE, N. C., May 25, 1880.  
Country townships heard from send McKoy delegates. Town fought Stedman and county man combined; we take four tenths delegation. Stedman has no strength in county, we have lost nothing.

We are unable to decipher the meaning of the intelligence from either source. We think, however, that Major Stedman's friends claim the town of Fayetteville and concede the county of Cumberland outside of the town to McKoy. This we think also is what Judge McKoy's friends are willing to admit and concede. Further than this the deponent sayeth not.

## MEETING OF BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

**Abstract of Proceedings.**  
The Board met in adjourned session at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon in His Honor Mayor Fishblate, in the chair and Aldermen Myers, VonGlabn, Bowden, Vollers, Foster, King, Lowry and Hill in attendance.

The Mayor stated that the object in calling the Board together was to consider the General Tax Ordinance. On motion the reading of the minutes was dispensed with. The General Tax Ordinance was then taken up and passed, with the rate of taxation on real and personal at 1 1/2 per cent—the same as last year.

Alderman Foster moved to appoint a committee on city fire insurance.

The ordinance relating to the tax on dogs was enacted to take effect from and after the 10th prox.

Alderman Foster moved that the Mayor advertise for bids from competent persons to make up the tax book and deliver the same complete to the city clerk.

Alderman Myers moved to amend so that the contract be given to Col. J. G. Burr at his bid—\$400; he having already the State and county lists to take. Alderman Myers' motion was lost and Alderman Foster's adopted.

A Committee consisting of the Mayor and Aldermen Myers and King was appointed to receive bids for listing the taxes and to act on the same.

The Committee on Fire Department was instructed to advertise for bids for the erection of a fire alarm belfry on the City Hall, and report at next meeting.

Alderman Foster moved that the cattle ordinance be amended so as to limit the enforcement of the same to the territory bounded by Red Cross, Seventh and Castle streets and the river. Adopted.

The following resolution, offered by Alderman King, provoked a long discussion between Aldermen Myers and King, who favored the resolution, and Aldermen Bowden and Foster, who opposed its adoption:

WHEREAS, In justice to the Wilmington Market Company, who have erected a handsome and airy market, with the necessary sheds for the protection of the market carts, both vegetable and fish, and as they propose to grant to said carts the necessary protection free of cost to them, and as the hucksters now occupying the sidewalks are encumbering the passage of travel on said streets, and also in justice and for the protection of the butchers of the city, who have or will occupy stalls in said new market house,

Resolved, That the Mayor be instructed to have the market carts, including fish carts and hucksters, removed at once between Dock, Orange and Front streets, and Red Cross and Fourth streets and the Railroad Bridge, provided the same can be done in accordance with law.

The yeas and nays were called and the resolution was adopted: yeas—the Mayor, Aldermen Myers, Vollers, VonGlabn, King, and Lowry; nays—Aldermen Bowden and Foster.

A petition for a lamp at the corner of Fifth and Wooster streets was referred to Committee on Lights.

A communication from the Chief of the Fire Department, reporting the killing of one of the horses used by the Little Giant Engine Company was referred to the Committee on Fire Department.

## A Runaway Accident.

Ezra Thomas, Esq., a well-known and respected citizen of Brunswick county, and his daughter, started this morning with a horse and buggy to come to this city, and when on the causeway on Eagle Island, between the two ferries, the horse took fright and, becoming unmanageable, ran away. Mr. Thomas managed to keep the animal in the road for sometime, but at last the horse got the better of the driver and sheered from the road, by which both occupants of the carriage were thrown into the ditch with considerable force. The young lady, who is happy to state, escaped without any injury further than an excessive fright, but Mr. Thomas received a severe bruise upon the arm and a laceration of the forehead.

Dr. F. W. Potter, of this city, was called upon and rendered such professional assistance as the case demanded. He informs us that the injuries to Mr. Thomas, although somewhat painful for the present, are not serious.
