Col. E. R. Brink, Chairman of the Committee, has issued a card stating that there will be no general parade this year on Decoration Day. The anniversary falls this year on Sunday, but Monday will be observed. There will be no procession under the control of the Committee, but all interested are invited to assemble at the National Cemetery, at the Eastern extremity of Market street, at 4 o'clock in the afternoon of the 31st inst., where there will be the usual services, opened with prayer by Rev. D. J. Sanders, and an address by Rev. D. D. Dodge. The decoration of the graves will close the observance of the day.

## Duties of Census Enumerators.

The duties of the enumerators are simple and require only ordinary intelligence and a conscientious performance. They are required especially to visit each abode and obtain the age, sex, race, color and condition of each occupant, including births and deaths to June 1 only, of which daily reports are to be made to the Supervisor and the General Superintendent at Washington. The compensation of enumerators is: For each death return 5 cents, for each establishment of public industry on the general schedule of manufactures (No. 3,) 15 cents; for each establishment of productive industry reported on special schedules of manufactures, 25 cents. For the return of living persons and of farms the rates will be varied according to the varying ease or difficulty of enumeration. The minimum allowance for a farm is 12 1/2 cents. For the two days of additional services in certifying the returns, \$2.50 per day will be allowed. In addition to the population, statistics of agriculture, manufactures and other industries, mortality, pauperism, crime, insanity, capital, churches, libraries, schools, etc., are to be collected under the supervision of special agents for each branch.
