#### About Corn and Wheat.

Corn loses one-fifth by drying and wheat one-fourteenth. From this the estimate is made it is more profitable for farmers to sell unshelled corn in the fall at 75 cents than at \$1 a bushel in the 24 hours. following summer; and that wheat at \$1.25 in December is equal to \$1.50 in the succeeding June. In the case of potatoes-taking these that rot and otherwise lost-together with the shrinkage, there is but little doubt that between October and June the loss to the owner who holds them is not less than 33 per cent.
