Stout and Timothy Porter, of New York, and Col. Whedbee, of Baltimore; besides other gentlemen whose names we have not now at our command. City Court.

There was but one case for the consideration of His Honor the Mayor this morning, that of Scipio Howard, colored charged with disorderly conduct. He was found guilty and sentenced to a fine of \$10, or 20 days in the city prison. Not having the necessary funds he was sent below.

Criminal Court.
In the case of George Merrick and Della Page, alluded to yesterday, a juror was withrawn and a mistrial recorded. Wm Goodman, charged with assault and battery, submitted and was held in \$200 bond to keep the peace until February term.

Two cases against Thomas M Gardner, for misconduct in office, were continued. The case of E. H. McQuigg, for misconduct in office, was continued.

In the case of W. B. Larkins and Wm. Phinney, for an affray, a nol pros was entered as to the former, and the latter was found guilty and sentenced to 15 days in the House of Correction.

For the want of time and space we are obliged to omit other cases disposed of during the day. The Court will adjourn to-night.

A Needed Reform.
There are a certain class of trial justices in this city who are a curse and a nuisance to this community, and we hope that the day is not far distant when this nuisance may not only be abated, but entirely abolished for all time to come.

To give a case in point: two gentlemen had a slight misunderstanding and personal difficulty on the private premises of a Commission Merchant on the wharf, a few days ago, when a few blows were passed. Immediately one of Justice McQuigg's runners, hearing of the difficulty, but not seeing it, makes an affidavit before this worthy Justice and the latter issues a warrant for the arrest of one or both of the parties to appear before him and answer to the charge of offending the peace and dignity of the State. But, mark you, the fellow who made the affidavit, as we are informed, has been a convicted felon, but was pardoned by Governor Brogden through political influence. His name is John Statcher, and he was arraigned at the last term of the Criminal Court upon a charge somewhat akin to this affidavit business known to the legal fraternity by the technical term of barratry. We think it is high time now that the courts, or some one high in authority, should take cognizance of the way this business of runners is being conducted. The people are beginning to cry aloud for redress. In fact, we would like to see the whole system of trial by magistrates abolished, with the single exception of one Special Magistrate who shall be a salaried officer and appointed by the legislature or chosen by the people. Before the war this system worked very well with us and until we had a New York code of laws rammed down our throats, during the evil days of reconstruction. We know of some honorable exceptions among these Justices, who do not countenance this practice of sending out runners, but then there are others who do, and we cannot understand why, under a Democratic administration, and with good, honest men in high judicial positions, good citizens and tax payers should be allowed to suffer such annoyances as frequently occur from some of these Trial Justices and their infamous runners. We heard of an instance where two colored women were quarrelling on the wharf, and one brushed against the other, but no blows passed, which got into court through the instrumentality of some of these hawks of a Trial Justice, which cost the county of New Hanover the sum of \$300 before the case was ended. Now here is a chance for reform, and the people are rightfully and justly indignant that such nuisances and practices should any longer be allowed to exist. Nine times out of ten judgment is suspended upon payment of costs, and this is the whole thing in a nut shell. How much of the fees or costs these runners get we are not prepared to say, but we do say it is time the whole thing was done away with, and we are willing to go our length in aiding to bring about the proper reform.

MR. EDITOR:

I saw a communication in last week's issue of the JOURNAL, from a correspondent at Fayetteville, urging the nomination of Judge McKoy for Congress. The reason he assigns for such a course is, that Wilmington or New Hanover county has had the honor long enough.

Now, I fail to see that as any reason at all. I care not from which portion of the district the candidate may hail from, if he is only of the right stripe and will faithfully represent the interests of his entire constituency. If Major Stedman should be thrown overboard by the convention, I think that the old Hanover county of Duplin should have the preference, and I hope the convention will so decide. Judge McKoy has a good position, and let him remain where he is. It is very certain that he cannot secure the strength of Pender county.

I also saw in the same number of the JOURNAL that you were in doubt as to how Pender county would vote in the State Convention. You say she will have only two delegates, and they are for Gov. Jarvis. The people of Pender are not particularly opposed to Gov. Jarvis, but I am aware that nine-tenths of her Democratic voters are in favor of Judge Fowle, believing him to be the strongest and consequently the most available man. If the delegates from Pender do not vote for Judge Fowle, in the Convention, they will not faithfully represent their county, nor the wishes of the Democratic party. C. Burgaw, N.
