

News from Europe.

LONDON, May 29—In the House of Commons to-day Premier Gladstone said he did not retract the epithet 'insane' which he applied to the Anglo-Turkish convention in his election speech, but it was not necessary for him, whatever his opinion, to repeat epithets, as the Government was not free in regard to the convention.

In the House of Lords yesterday the Burial Bill, permitting the burial of dissenters in all churchyards and cemeteries without the Church of England service, was read for the first time.

The Aborigines Protection Society has received a telegram from Cape Town, dated the 27th inst., stating that papers before Parliament include a dispatch from the Administrator of Basutoland acquitting the Government that there is an excessive strain on the loyalty of the Basutos owing to their disarming. He reports that the agitation is widespread, and that the whole country is bewildered, and that the prestige of the Government is at low ebb and calls for physical force.

Frederick Sharpe, stock and share broker here, has failed owing to losses in the American department on the Exchange.

The telegraph between the frontier of British Bechuanaland and Maudslayi has been cut.

BERLIN, May 28—The lower house of the Prussian Diet to-day discussed the Church bill. Herr von Puttkammer, Minister of Ecclesiastical Affairs, said a compromise with the Church was only attainable little by little in the Prussian Legislature. The clause relating to the recall of bishops must absolutely be passed. The main object of the other clauses was to prevent harsh collisions with the May laws on questions which could only be dealt with from a political, not an ecclesiastical, point of view. Herr Windhorst, of the Centre, opposed the measure and declared that no peace could be concluded without the Pope. The debate was then adjourned.

LONDON, May 29—A Berlin despatch to the Standard says: 'The commission appointed by Russia to investigate the condition of her iron industry has recommended that agricultural and other machines from abroad should be imported free of customs duty shall henceforth pay a duty, and that the duties on those already in use shall be largely increased.'

ST. PETERSBURG, May 28—All the sentences of the nihilist prisoners at the Welmar trial have been commuted to twenty and fifteen years at hard labor in the mines respectively.

ROME, May 28—In the Chamber of Deputies at the second balloting for the Presidential Bureau Signori Bignone and Varesi, Dissidents; Marrogano, Constitutionalist, and Spantiganti, Ministerialist, were elected Vice Presidents. Signor Farini accepted the Presidency of the Chamber, stating that on account of the unanimous vote he could not refuse.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 28—The three Mussulman prisoners charged with the recent attempted assassination and robbery of Mr. Burress, an English subject, have been tried and sentenced—two to fifteen years and the other to seven years penal servitude.

MR. GOSCHEN, the new British Ambassador, has arrived and Sir Austin Layard will leave for England on Tuesday next.

RAGUSA, May 28—The Chief of the Albanian League decided on the 26th inst. to order the forces at Tusi to take the offensive against the Montenegrins.

CAROLINA.

Charlotte News: We learn as we go to press that Cabarrus Democratic Convention, to-day, endorsed for Jarvis and Robinson for Governor and Lieut. Governor, and Maj. C. Dowd for Congress.

Raleigh Post: Mr. Best, they say, has come to time, and will immediately assume control of affairs in the Western enterprise. On Thursday night we received information direct from New York through a source we could not discredit, that Messrs. Grace, Tappan and Fish had positively with drawn from Mr. Best on the ground that the property was worth nothing like as much as represented to them. The absence of either of the three names in the Directory, would seem to confirm the statement to us.

Raleigh News: Mr. Matthew Edits, a Wake county farmer, who lives near Eagle Rock, is 90 years old, but he cut a new tooth the other day for all that. This case will be considered at the Dental Convention next week. We saw yesterday a very fine minute book presented to the Society of Alumni of the University by Colonel W. L. Saunders, the Secretary and Treasurer of that body. The assistant secretary, Mr. E. B. Engelhard, was busy preparing it for the meeting at the commencement next week.

Oxford Free Lance: Our doctors are now kept very busy and an unusual quantity of sickness is reported throughout the country. There are now five prisoners confined in the county jail, of whom two are women charged with the murder of their own children. The smoke-house of Mr. James Waller, of Knapp of Reeds, was raided upon last Saturday night and a large quantity of meat, maul &c, carried off. Entrance was effected by means of a sledge.

Newbernian: It is now twenty-four days since we have had a noticeable rain in this immediate section. The thermometers in this city for the past few days, have indicated the weather heat during the warmest hours, at from 90 to 97 degrees.

Lewis Miller, Frank Archibald and Washington White, the incendiary colored trio who were committed by Mayor Maully for setting fire to our county jail while confined as prisoners heretofore on the night of January 16th last, were tried before Judge Gudgeon on Wednesday last, found guilty, and sentenced to the penitentiary; Miller for 25 years and the other two for 15 years each.

Concord Star: The wheat is being harvested and turns out pretty fair. Between cradling wheat and killing grass the farmers find themselves busy enough and we hardly ever see one in town to ask how the crops are getting on. The clock wagon that has been going about the country, has been heard from. Stopping at the house of an old lady in Rowan, they tried to sell her a clock, but failing to do so, they concluded to leave one at her house anyway, until they called again. She signed a paper that they drew up and which they told her was merely a certificate showing that they had left the clock at her house. One of her neighbors saw it the next day and it proved to be a chattel mortgage for \$38 which she had signed. They have not yet come back for the clock, but when they do there's going to be a row.

Charlotte Observer: Special telegrams to the Observer give the following information concerning the conventions held in neighboring counties yesterday: Cabarrus sends instructions for M. J. C. Dowd, of Charlotte for Governor and Lieut. Governor. Catawba instructed for M. L. McCorkle for Governor. No instructions were given as to State officers. Statesville township conventions voted down a resolution instructing for Armfield for Congress, but passed one instructing for Jarvis.

Mr. W. A. Stanton, who recently succeeded Mr. Arthur Macy, as superintendent of the King's Mountain Mine, was in the city yesterday afternoon, and brought with him 214 ounces of amalgam which is to be separated at the assay office. This was taken from a 'cleaning up' after a run of 157 hours. The mine is now working 100 hands and is doing better than it has done for several years, a rich vein having recently been struck in the new works. It is learned that the Carolina Central Railway Company will run an extra train to Rockingham on the day the district convention meets.

Raleigh Observer: Old bonds to the amount of \$29,000 were received at the State Treasury yesterday. During the week \$78,600 were received. The total subscriptions to the fund for the erection of a monument to Crocker and McMillan, who lost their lives in Penny's pond, on the 8th, now amount to \$325,96. Maj. J. W. Wilson reports that the Western road is graded to Asheville. The work of laying iron could be completed in three weeks. Iron will have to be purchased, as there is not now enough to lay the track to Asheville. The collections and deposits of internal revenue in the Fourth district of North Carolina for the week ending May 29, 1880, amounted to \$3,666.54. The grantees of the Western North Carolina Railroad have organized the new company in accordance with the provisions of the act making the sale of the property, by electing as a Board of Directors the following gentlemen: W. J. B. St. T. M. Logan, F. F. Milne, John Hovey, W. T. Dortch, R. B. Vance, A. B. Andrews, A. C. Avery and W. E. Anderson. They have paid to the State Treasury \$4,935.33, the interest on the first mortgage bonds required to be paid by them, according to the contract, from the date of the ratification of the act up to the first of May. They have also deposited in the State Treasury \$10,014.66, which sum is more than sufficient to cover the other expenditures made by the State since the ratification. The new administration

Fell From the Third Story.

Elijah Smith, a white lad about 14 years of age, employed by Mr. D. A. Smith as a varnish boy in his furniture establishment on Front street, fell from the third story to-day about 1 o'clock. The little fellow was taking his dinner hour, and after his meal, which he had brought with him in a bucket, commenced playing with the fall and tackle on the East end of the building. There was no one but himself and an old colored woman in the third story at the time of the accident, and we understand from her that little Smith was trying to draw up a hoghead, when he lost his balance and fell against a bar across the door which gave way and precipitated him to the ground, thirty feet below. Doctors Walker and Barbak were called in and after examination pronounced that the little fellow's leg was broken. The sufferer also complained of his back. There may be some internal injuries which may result in death.

The little fellow we understand is orphan and lives with his sister on Front, between Castle and Queen streets.
